## WHAT'S THE TRADER DISPUTE ABOUT?

Lionel Pickering, millionaire print boss and owner of the Trader group of free newspapers sacked 90 printers from his Heanor Gate plant on December 4th, 1986.

He sent couriers round to the homes of the workforce at around 7am in the morning to issue "sack-o-grams" to each printer in turn. They were told they had been sacked and not to try to enter the factory ever again.

Though the printers were shocked by this appalling act, they were not really surprised. Throughout the nine months of pay negotiations that preceded the "dirty deed" of Dec. 4th, Pickering had lied to them, threatened

them, twisted their words and had tried to trick and cheat them at every turn.

The printers - after much difficult negotiation - had got Pickering to agree to a 4% wage deal. Seven weeks later he tore up the agreement, issued a totally different "settlement" and demanded the printers accept the new deal. Outraged, the printers immediately began an overtime ban. It had only been in effect for one day when the infamous sack-ograms were issued.

Immediately the printers occupied the Heanor Gate plant and spoke angrily of their determination to win their jobs back. Feeling that they could not sustain the occupation they began a 24 hour picket outside the factory which has continued to this day.

Since December 4th, Pickering has been forced to move his printing operation time and again. After a brief run at the Evening Post's presses at Breaston he eventually moved most of the work to the non-unionised plant at Ad-scene in Canterbury. The NGA workers at their unionised plant at Welshpoolin an apalling show of class treachery- are continuing to print some of the Trader titles.



strike "official". The NGA are paying strike pay but have only publicised the dispute once in the union paper "NGA Print", and very few officials have ever visited the picket line.

Printers, with the backing of their supporters, have been picketing, harrasing Trader publicity stands, leafletting, gathering the support of other unions, sending Traders back, marching, organising and agitating.

You can read elsewhere in this newsletter the range of activities and actions that together 1s putting the pressure on Pickering.

He is having to reduce the price of his advertising by up to 45% just to fill up space. And while he has to pick up the cost of having his printing done elsewhere he is keeping his Heanor Gate factory empty and idle. Everywhere his scab workers go, they are greeted with angry pickets. Hundreds of copies of the Trader arrive back every week. And meanwhile as Pickering flounders more and more, support for the printers grows daily.

They need our support. Getinvolved in the Trader dispute. See this struggle through to victory!

On a national basis, support from the NGA has been pitiful. Printers have had to waste much energy in pushing the NGA to keep the SUPPORT THE PRINTERS!

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Alongside the 24 hour picket outside of the Heanor Gate site there have been other regular pickets, comprising both printers and their supporters, at various sites around the area.

PICKETT

In the main these have taken place at -Langley Mill, where, on the Vic Hallam site, the paste-up work is presently being done; and at the Leicester Trader office.

But the following excerpts from our diary should give you some indication of just what's been cracking off:

#### BREASTON. MONDAY FEB' 2nd.

It was discovered that the plant owned by T. Bailey Foreman (remember him ?) at Breaston had been printing the Trader on Pickering's behalf. About 50 of us gathered for this, the second, picket outside of the Breaston plant. It was cold, dark and drizzling to boot. Yet, the 'forces of reaction' don't always have it their own way and this chappy's car was left in urgent need of a panel beater's attention; and a well aimed boot removed his left hand rear brake light.

#### HUTHWAITE. TEUSDAY FEB' 10th.

A less vigorous confrontation.

The bosses representatives in blue, awkward as only the Miner's strike hardened Notts. police can be, insisted that only 2 of us could stand in the roadway and threatened our much practiced and enthusiastic phtographer with arrest if he continued to ply his trade.

Well, that gives some idea I think. Thankfully the sun has begun to shine (for a while at least) and those early rises and hours of standing about seem far less unattractive. B.P

By 9 pm we decided that the scabs either weren't turning up, or on seeing the mass of angry pickets, they'd slunk off back to the pits from which they were lured with bribes.

#### LANGLEY MILL. SUNDAY FEB' 8th.

The scabs in their motorcars drive back and forth along the main road, whilst their former workmates and their supporters crowd the entrance to the Vic Hallam site. But there's scabbing to be done; and they sit po-faced and tight-lipped as they crawl through the assembled pickets huddled inside their protective motorcars.

Of course, there's always one arsehole shittier than the rest. And this particular pile of shit drove straight at the picket line, knocking one printer to the floor and carrying another half running, half sitting on the bonnet for 30 yards till, as thecar swerved sideways, she in her turn was thrown to the ground. His murderous desire still not satisfied, he then began to chase pickets around the car park at speed, leaving another cut and bruised as the picket dived out of the way to avoid graver injury.

## GREMLYN HUGHES

On the 27th March, Emlyn Hughes (t.v. personality and a pillock extraordinaire) came to Nottingham as part of a publicity campaign for Pickering's scab papers. He put in appearances at various shops and firms around Nottingham as a guest of 'The Trader' newspapers. It was no coincidence that the shops and firms he visited just happened to be the major advertisers in Pickering's periodicals.

Along with the crowd of autograph hunters and photographers were about 10 people from the then newly formed Trader Sacked Workers' Support Group. With placards and a loudhailer we followed Emlyn around Nottingham in a van- sometimes reaching his next port of call before he did! The biggest turnout was at the main Co-op in the City Centre; where some of us managed to get inside and succeeded in bothering Emlyn so much that he had to cut short his visit to the store. When asked why he was aiding Pickering in his quest to smash the unions, Emlyn said that he had an obligation to carry out the terms of his contract. He promised that as soon as his contract ended, he would pledge his support for the sacked printworkers. Like hell he will! The turnout for all the pickets was good and laid firm foundations for future actions for the Trader Workers' Support Group. Jimi.

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## **INJUNCTIONS and TRIBUNALS**

Due to increasing levels of picketing at several of the Trader plants, Lionel Pickering made an abortive attempt to bring injunctions against 8 of the sacked Trader printw orkers. Obviously what he wanted from a court ruling was to prevent any form of "militant" action by 8 of the strikers who he saw as "organisers" and key figures. In this he failed dismally.

The decision returned was a dismissal of injunctions against 4 of the strikers, which resulted in Pickering being ordered to pay court costs running into thousands of pounds. The injunctions against the remaining 4 were only partially upheld. The ruling returned was that they must not say or do anything that constitutes "abusive language" or "threatening behaviour".

Within 13 weeks of dismissal the strikers have the right to apply to an industrial tribunal to claim unfair dismissal. This has been done, but normally takes a very long time before a decision is reached, partly because each case takes a week to be heard; and also a decision will not be made until all of the cases have been heard.

Because this would mean waiting well over a year for a decision, the tribunal has agreed to hear more than one case a week, and to reach its final decision by October of this year.

If the decision reached is favourable, then this could mean either reinstatement or compensation. However, the strikers will have to abide by the decision whatever the outcome. This could effectively mean an end to the dispute.

This must have been a real blow to Pickerings finances, and to his hopes of smashing the printers resolve.

### Is Pickering coming back to Heanor Gate?

Interesting things seem to be afoot at the empty Heanor Gate factory (Trader Web Offset where all the Trader papers were printed before the dispute).

Faced with the massive rates bill for the premises, as well as a massive heating bill for keeping the plant warm enough for printing, Mr Pickering has itching to get back into the premises to start the presses rolling.But up till now , there were no signs of it happening.

However in the past month activity has been noticiably stepped up.At the end of March a sacked worker, driving past the factory, noticed two uniformed Police inspectors on the hill at the back of the plant. They pointed at the road and made notes, probably rough ideas on where to deploy, the Police in case of any Mass Picketing. Plus, in the last week of April, Pickets at Heanor Gate noticed known scabs driving past in their lunch hour. Most importantly, the printing contracts Pickering made with Scabby Printworks up and down the country, run out in the next couple of months. Therefore, we can expect Pickering to be back to Heanor Gate by the Summer, and when he does, we should be ready for him!

## The Councils and the Trader

After agreeing to withdraw advertising and generally not "trade with the Trader", Nottinghamshire County Councilseem to have run into problems. After over 3 months of the dispute, adverts from Notts. still appear in the Trader, and the City Council have had their own council newspaper delivered inside the Trader!

Their problems seem to stem from advice that the moves may be illegal in Notts., and managment in publicity not realising that they are trading with the Trader.

There's a simple solution. The ruling Labour groups must give clear instructions that adverts must be withdrawn and no trade given to the Trader. Derbyshires Labour City Council have found it easy to find legal justification for their moves, so come on Notts!



## The Trader May Day March

Saturday May 2nd is Nottingham's MayDay march, something that's normally a bit of a damp squib in this City. The crawl around the city centre when no one's around before rushing off to the usual obscure venue, listen to a boring Vote Labour speaker and then getting pissed .Not very inspiring at all.

This year however, if we get as many people as possible (that includes you!), we can make it a day to remember. This year, the Trader dispute has given something <u>real</u> to work around, rather than the tired old Labour Party anthem.

MayDay should be a day when working-class people can get together, display their unity, have fun and show the bosses they won't be pushed around. It isn't at the moment, but we've got to start somewhere, and the Trader Dispute is probably the best place to start.

The struggle for T.U. recognition and for the right to work at the Trader printers is now entering its 22nd week. 22 weeks of picketing 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It's been a long and cold winter but we've endured, we've had high court injunctions against us but were not frightened, we've had police harassment on the picket line but we will not be intimidated. Mr. Pickering, the boss of the Trader has attacked us in his newspapers that are being produced by scabs. Tory M.P.s have attacked us in the columns of of the Trader newspapers. The columns of the Derby Trader are now totally devoted to attacking the Derbyshire Labour County Council and the Trade Unions, and is now no more than a right wing propaganda sheet.

Despite all the smears and propaganda we have not wavered in our defiance of these bully boy tactics and our determination is as firm as ever for the fight for T.U. rights. The organisation of support and solidarity is now more important than ever, we can not win alone. The support of trade unionists and socialists is vital if we are to carry on the struggle. Every trade union branch and shop stewards comittee must invite a sacked printworker to speak at their meeting. There is no substitute for this direct contact. Collections must be organised in a systematic way and on a regular basis.

Visits to the picket line at Heanor are also needed, to boost morale as well as showing managment that we are not alone. Remember that the fact that we are picketing has kept the printing works from being used. The presses have not run since the 4th of December, the day that we were sacked. Managments intentions were to print again under the mistaken belief that we would soon give up due to hardship caused by the sackings. This dispute is costing Mr Pickering thousands of pounds every week that the presses in Heanor stand idle.

This struggle can be won, and sooner if we had the support of the Labour council in Nottingham and the support of the Co Op in Nottingham, there is no excuse for not giving workers in struggle the support and solidarity that's neccesary now when they need it most. It's only solidarity and unity in struggle that's ever achieved victory for the working class. Every act of solidarity with the Trader Sacked Workers is also rebuilding our movement, building up the confidence of workers confident of their own power. That's what Mr Pickering fears and what the Tories try to break - workers power, that's the power that can change the world. The world needs changing give

The Nottingham Sacked Trader Printworkers Support Group has been in existence for two months and operates as an open group which welcomes all people who wish to provide practical support and help for the printers.

The Nottingham Support group organizes a wide variety of activities in liason with the sacked workers.

These include fund raising activities such as the recent Benefit gig at the Garage which raised £238 (neat profit). We've also organized actions against the Trader in Nottingham.

We started with a phone blockade of the Trader office which had a limited amount of success, then a concerted campaign of returning copies of the Trader back to the Derby office packed in 'unsolicited mail' wrappers. This generated such a volume of mail that the Post Office had to throw it all away.
