

Afew political points

The reaction of the National Health Service Consultants to their new terms of contract highlights the archaic conditions that pertain in the medical profession.

One can't really argue against the consultants demands for more money for the job nor even against a reduction in their basic working week. After all every worker would like a basic £7.000 p.a. for a 30hr. week. Even the tactics which the consultants propose to use to get around their contract, e.g. counting travelling time as working time in order to qualify for overtime rates at £8 per hour would earn approval from trade union militants. However as their demands can only be met at the expense of both, hospital staff (most of whom earn less than £2,000 gross for a working week of up to 50 hours) and of the treatment given to N.H.S. patients, the Consultants should not be too surprised if Hospital Nursing and Ancillary Staff refuse to co-operate with their greedy demands.

Hospital work is arduous and demanding and as in all similar conditions the brunt of the work falls on young people both Nurses and Doctors who however have little or no say in hospital policy. Senior Consultants of course often sit on Hospital governing bodies and so have even more control over their




subordinates lives and futures as well as being able to obtain preferential treatment for their private patients.

The abolition of private patients is only one reform which the Hospital service is in need of. Better pay and conditions for junior staff. A huge increase in the number of young people being trained as Doctors and Nurses with opportunities for Nurses to qualify as Doctors are some of the things needed to break the stranglehold which Consultants and the B.M.A. has over the National Health Service.

The strike at 'Intex Yarns' (ICI)
Ashton Under Lyne on victimisation
grounds against shop steward Dave
Hallsworth who was accused by management (without any proof) of sabotage has exploded into a bloody situation in which right wing strong arm men are going around intimidating Trade Union militants, in two cases shop stewards have been slashed with razors and beaten.

THE REFORMATION.

On April 1st. of this year our funloving leaders, who always have the nations interests at heart, decided to play an April Fools joke on the people. 'Let's have a reform of Local Governm-

ent' they said.

So they put on their 'serious-faced' masks and solemnly announced that the old local government system was inefficient and that this new system would rectify these faults. What was wrong with the old system as far as they were concerned.

1). SMALLNESS.

'Too many authorities lacked sufficient resources to be able to provide a wide range and high standard of services! Therefore the new authorities were made larger and fewer than the old. In 'intellectual' circles of course bigness is the answer to everything. Where would we be without multi-national corparations, empires, banks and so forth? The answer is that we would be a whole lot better off.

2). COMPLEXITY

There were no fewer than nine different types of elected local authority' The new local government structure is much less complex. This second piece of brilliant logic says that variety must be minimized because by doing so problems will automatically be minimized. On a much more drastic level, Adolf Hitler had the same idea, and the authoritarian left is also intolerant towards differences of opinion. However political maneouvering necessitated that the supposedly simple system become complex again but in a different manner i.e. the complexity covered larger areas and was more aouthoritarian. 3). APATHY AND SUBORDINATION.

'Many observers deplored the low turn-out figures at local elections, and the apparent lack of either interest or Knowledge among the bulk of the

population'.

PART SERVICE CONTROL

'Local authorities were too dependant on central government for funds, and subject to too many instructions'.

Under the new system local elections take place on the same day each year. This magic recipe gives the mass media a better chance of publicity for local elections and thus automatically increase the publics interest in them. Has it ever occurred to anybody that maybe local government does not relate to the people in any case? People can hardly be expected to take local authorities seriously when these authorities are

constantly quoting Ministerial circulars, and applying for extra central government funds. If you don't believe this try making any enquiry at any local authority office!

One section of the population has benefited from local government Reform however. That is the professionals who work: in local authorities. The creation of Districts with wider powers than previously created an instant excessive demand for more professionals like planners. The result is that we now have lots of overpaid idiots (like myself) who only help to create double the amount of paper, pushing than there was previously.

The Town Planning press, however, is constantly claiming that we are tremendously short of planners. Why do I therefore spend several days in most weeks merely twiddling my thumbs, reading a good novel, doing some scetching or discussing how various football teams are likely to fare during the season?

Policies you would have thought would have changed drastically since the old local authorities were so inefficient. However, what a county like Tyne and Weir has done is to merely adopt the policies of the old local authorit-

ies.

Well, whats wrong with local authorities as they are at present? Quite simply they are undemocratic. More often than not they are merely puppets of Whitehall. In some cases they are even corrupt little empires for the sole benefit of some local notable. This isn't surprising when considering what the idiot who designed the Reform think on the topic of democracy.

The biggest arse-licker on this issue is Lord Redcliffe-Mauol who has been the chairman of several 'Independant' commissions on Local Government. The purpose of local government is to do for the people what a group of persons elected accordingly to law, by a majority of the citizens but on election becoming representatives of them, all conceive to be good within the limit of their legal powers'. If you care to analyse this quote you can see how sinister the local government system is. Firstly, a group of persons decide what they concieve to be good for all of us. Secondly, this self same group are limited by the powers that Parliaments give them.

Lord Redcliffe-Maud would be the first to admit that low turn-outs at local government elections and a lack of interest or knowledge of local government affiars by a vast majority of the population, make local government a very dubious example of a democratic institution. He would also point out that many local administrations such as gas, electricity and water boards are not directly accountable for their actions although they provide extremely important services, on the same breadth Redcliffe-Maud

claims that since local councillors have to face their electorate every four years and this local election ensures a measure of local accountability.

The question we must ask is 'Do we need planners, engineers, social services and rulers over us in general? If you are reading this article the chances are that you are very doubtful about the need for such ineffect-

ual and imposing institutions.

The most positive action to take, therefore is to destroy these institutions. As far as planning is concerned this is quite easy. Anybody can put in an application for planning permission on any piece of land regardless of whether you own it. If you do not own a piece of land you must notify the owner that you are applying for permission. In fact, you can even put in an application for changing the use of your local council offices into a childrens playgroup centre, or housing. The local authority if the procedure is carried through correctly are obliged to put these applications to the planning committee. If they lay them aside you can appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment after 2 months have lapsed for non-determination. Even if the Planning Committee refuses permission for the application you can still to the Minister. The fun part is that (a) the Department of the Environment is about 6 months behind in handling appeals, (b) appeals keep local authority planning staff incredibly busy.

Following such procedures has a double usefulness (a) It can be used to literally bugger-up the works of local authority planning, (b) it can be used to publicize various issues such as lack of housing or lack of community

facilities etc. Furthermore, there
can be no danger of central government
taking over a straining local government system since central government
would also crack under the work load.

Our leaders have had their laugh.
Under the guise of reform they have
made local government more remote and
authoritarian. Now its our turn. Let's
take the opportunity. I'll be happy
when I am out of a job.

Compared to some countries, the top-brass of the British Army nave it easy. If they were presented with a situation, like the one which exists in the Dutch Army their florid faces would turn a darker shade of puce.

In 1966, a new union was organised in Holland, the BOND VOOR DIENST-PLICHTIGEN, or in English, the union of Conscripted Soldiers. In its short existence, the B.V.D. has won a number of victories from the military establishment on quite a few issues. Wages have been increased, the 40 hour week, improvements in Army food, an end to saluting to name but a few.

The B.V.D. membership is 31,000 about two thirds of conscripts which is a majority of the army. The unions latest demand is for overtime for weekend work and ceremon-

ial parades.

The union maintains vocal weekly pickets around the Dutch equivalent of the Ministry of Defence to remind the generals of their demands.

Recently, a vote was taken on the overtime issue and now the threat of strike action hangs over Dutch military bases.




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DUNLOPILLIA



The long struggle against the hated Friday night shift has ended with Dunlop conceding victory to their rubber process workers.

With a £30 per week minimum wase plus a reduction of 22 hours in the working week this represents a real victory for direct action by the rubber workers. Plants at Speke, Birmingham and in Scotland have refused to work the Friday night shift for the last 4 months. Other Rubber Plant workers are now expected to demand similar conditions.

THELL HELL ARE LOUR YATA'S LIRA JUSH BUT HELL'S

BUT NOT FREEDOM

Colonial policies of governments change not because they suddenly develop a moral attitude about self rule and racial equality but because there continuation threaten the economic and political interests of the imperial power. Both Britian and France have granted independance to their firmer African colonies for these reasons. They realised that their rule had become untenable.

It is this realisation of Rhodisia's position that prompted Mr. Vorster, the South Africa's prime minister, change of heart. Both the economic and political interests of South Africa are threatened by the continuation of white supremacy rule of their northern neighbour. Mr Vorster no longer thinks that blacks are not capable of ruling themselves, He mo longer thinks of them as uncivilised, as long as by throwing Mr Smith the prime minister of Rhodesia and the white settlers to the 'wolves' he can buy time for his own and the continual rule of the whites in South Africa.

A number of things have made Mr Vorster change his mind. The realities of power have changed since the South African government supported Mr Smiths unilateral declaration of independance in 1965. But it has not been the economic sanctions imposed by the member countries of the United Nations, but the fact that the Black nationalist movement has gained the advantage over the Rhodesian security forces that has changed the situation in Rhodesia. For just over two years now nationalist guerrillas have been infiltrating into Rhodesia. With a newly independent Mozambique, Rhodesia would have great difficulty in opposing the black nationalists attacks from there and Zambia. In fact a General Yarborough - former head of the United States Special Forces has warned the Smith regime that the situation had all the markings of another Vietnam. This also would mean that the South African government would have to increase its own number of security forces already operating alongside the Rhodesians. The war against the nationalist guerrillas just could not be won.

Although Zambia has given the nationalists guerrillas training



facilities and assistance, President Kaunda wanted a settlement for
his own economic ends. He needs trade
links with Rhodesia since Zambia's
main export copper has collapsed.
With a friendly Rhodesia their exports would take a more direct route
to the coast.

Mozamboque also would like a settlement since the newly independant
country would rely heavily on the
gold received from South Africa in
return for the thousands of their
workers employed in the mines there.
In fact both the black and the white
governments in Southern Africa want
an end to war. In this situation Mr
Smith and his government will have
to go. Governments no matter what
colour or ideology deal in political
and economic realities. The reality
for Rhodesia is an end to white supremacy.

we will soon see that the very people who in the past have been unfit to govern' will be forming a government. The privileged white settlers will no longer be able to lord it over the blacks. If they cannot stomach their fall to equality then they can leave for the mother country.

But while all the abuses, indignities and outright slavery of white
supremacy rule will pass, what will
take its place will be a class society. The colour of the skins of the
rulers might change but the black
workers lot will remain essentially
the same.

Workers will have little or no say in the decisions affecting their lives. One man, one vote will mean choosing masters instead of them being imposed. Independance will mean being ruled by their own countrymen, but the boss, the government and the institutions of the state will remain. Until these are abloished people will not really be free.

One begins to wonder whether the cash liquidity shortage was caused by the dirty workers refusing to invest in Heath's 3 day society. Cash and Carry - The Can.

However the balance is being redressed by the treatment being meeted out to the worker-cooperatives whose growing pains have induced so much belly-acheing amongst the bosses.

Land developers like Northern Investments want the Government to take some of their land back off their hands at inflated prices.



as to their profitability, and yet the total amount which Benn has offered to the three workers co-operatives: I.P.D. of Kirkby, Meriden Workers Co-operative and the project ed Scottish Daily News is only one fifth of the initial advance which is being given to Leylands.

TRIUMPH TAKE OFF?

One bright spot is that Norton-Villiers-Triumph Director Dennis Poore's attempts to set the Small-Heath motor-cycle workers against the Meriden experiment has backfired on him. It has been agreed by the workers of the three factories involved, Meriden, Small-Heath and Wolverhampton that the only alternative to the proposed Meriden (cooperative) system must be 3 factory production under state control. It is to be hoped that this will be the end of Poore's assett stripping on behalf of his parent company Manganese-Bronze. To quote an N.V.T. spokesman, 'We would much rather have the Meriden system which would give us control of the product without any responsibility rather than the 3 factory system for which we would have to take full responsibility'. If the Meriden workers keep up the consultation with their fellow motor-cycle workers, they stand more chance of resisting pressure from both N.V.T. and the Government.

SOLUTIONS

Fortunatly there are some positive aspects of the situation which Mr. Evans will be able to utilise. For instance there are 40,000 new 3 bedroom houses which are lying empty and unsold. He will be able to municipalise these immediately thanks to the Governments generous offer of cash grants for this purpose.

He will be able to municipalise
the Property Developers, Land Banks
again using the Governments generous offer of cash help, and following Labour past statments on nousing
land he won't have to pay more than
double its agricultural value, thus
ensuring a fair profit for all.



Following the settlement of the Building Unions pay claim for a much lower figure than anyone expected, messrs. Crosland and Evans will be able to give the green light for the 'Direct Works' building verartments of the larger councils to embark in a crash building programmes, and because most large authorities employ a practical planning staff, most people can be rehoused in decent sized pleasant housing units at far less cost than Bovis Homes or Northern Developments could do with their trendy village developments.

Following the fantastic saving of public money which will follow from Mr. Evans dynamic course of action we can expect Mr. Crosland to use these funds to improve the amenities and appearance of council housing estates as a whole.

A comparitively small amount of extra money can double the number of maintenance workers on council estates. Many workers who by middle age have had their health ruined by years of factory working conditions would welcome the opportunity to take part in improving their living conditions. Flat corridors and stairs could be kept clean and free from vandalism. Supervised play schemes for young children would give young mothers more freedom and security, and enable them to develop their own lives, while there are not many council estates which would not be improved by more flower beds and trees.

The process workers union in the factory the National Union of Dyers Bleachers and Textile Workers appear to have taken an authoritarian attitude toward the strike and have refused to recognise it. They have arbitrally expelled two members without giving them a chance to defend themselves. The union justification for this course, is a catch 22 rule of 'acting contary to union interests.

When 50 of the strikers occupied the Union H.Q. in Bradford in protest against the expulsions, fly boys in the union bureaucracy fabricated a bomb scare in order to force the demonstrators out of the building.

Claude Lavender a Bradford based member of the N.U.B.D.T.W. National Executive took up the case of the expelled members and was promptly expelled for his pains on the same catch 22 grounds as the other two.

The Intex workers are now in an embattled situation with facing not only an intransigent management but a reactionary union and right wing thugs at their backsides as well. They need all the support that can be given. All offers of support and donations to:
