New group for London

At the School's Out national conference on 28 October, a new group was launched for lesbians, gay men and bisexual people working or otherwise involved in education in and around London.

Since School's Out was formed in 1994, we have encouraged the creation of local groups. There are now affiliated lesbian, gay and bisexual groups in the East Midlands, Avon. Birmingham and Leeds. The East Midlands group. Pink Chalk, has been running almost as long as School's Out and has made a great success of its regular meetings where invited speakers and discussion groups provide the main focus.

Until now, although most School's Out national organising meetings are held in London, there has not been any group focusing directly on the capital. Now there is.

Unnamed as yet (School's Out in London?), the group will meet for the first time on Friday 1 December at the Institute of Education, Russell Square, WC1 at 6.30pm - Room 604. The meeting will begin with a series of five-minute presentations of personal coming out experiences from four or five invited speakers. This will lead into a discussion about some of the issues raised and then a short session to plan what the new group might do over the coming months - and how to organise it.

At the end of the meeting (7.30-8pm) we will adjourn to a local pub or bar (probably the Drill Hall) to continue our

At the first Birmingham NUT General Meeting of this term, a new Lesbian and Gay motion was passed unanimously.

The motion had been adapted from the national School's Out motion to make it relevant to Birmingham's requirements. It enables us to set up an ad hoc sub committee in Birmingham which will be used to serve the needs of all lesbian and gay teachers in the city. The sub committee will also be used to influence Birmingham NUT's policies, to make them more supportive to gay and lesbian people in education.

Conference Report

About fifty people attended the 1995 School's Out Conference at ULU on 28 October. A mixture of constructive discussion and the occasional flash of more heated debate seemed to make for a positive and forward looking meeting.

The high spot for many was the surprise appearance of Jane Brown, head of Kingsmead school, to answer questions and then lead a workshop on the lessons to be learned from her experiences. The other keynote speaker, Peter Purton, gave those of us struggling to make the NUT a more lesbian & gay friendly place cause for hope. Peter is the Equal Opportunities Officer for the further education union, NATFHE. The union has already put in place many of the things that School's Out is demanding of the NUT - proof that education unions can be proactive on lesbian and gay issues.

Harassment Guidelines

The workshop on harassment talked about what should go into a future School's Out document giving guidance to lesbian and gay teachers. The draft of the document is now under discussion. If you would like a copy of the draft, phone Geof on (0171) 582 2325.

School's Out - The best name?

A number of members suggested that School's Out was not an appropriate name for the organisation on the grounds that (a) it sounds too flippant, (b) it's an Americanism and (c) it sounds like an "in joke". The debate on the issue was quite polarised with several speakers adamant that the current name was fine - and pointing out the difficulties associated with altering the name of a relatively new organisation. An alternative viewpoint supported by some present was that School's Out could be used as a general campaigning name, but that we should seek an alternative name which we would use for more "official" communication - eg with government departments, etc. A fourth possibility was to amend our logo, "working for lesbian and gay equality in education", so that it could be used as an alternative name in this kind of communication.

Bisexuality

The question of whether School's Out should include bisexuals in the name of the organisation, and/or make it clear in our publicity that we consider that bisexuals have a place in School's Out, is one which has been raised a number of times since our launch. One of the reasons why Pink Chalk initially sought to distance itself from School's Out was because it wished to be more explicit in welcoming bisexual people.

There were bisexual people at the Conference who complained that it was unclear to them whether they were welcome or not.

School's Out does have bisexual members.

The accusation of lack of clarity seems fair: although School's Out did decide at its first committee meeting to use only the term 'lesbian and gay' in publicity, we do not state anywhere that only lesbians and gay men may join (we don't even state that straight people may not!)

There seem to be three possible positions (though members may think of others!)

- 1 School's Out continues to use the term "lesbian and gay" in publicity and states explicitly that only "lesbians and gay men" may join or attend meetings.
- 2 School's Out adopts the term "lesbian, gay and bisexual" in all publicity.
- 3 School's Out adopts the term "lesbian, gay and bisexual" in publicity and agrees a code of practice which seeks to define and prohibit behaviour or topics of discussion which may be unacceptable to those attending meetings. This may appear horribly bureaucratic, but there apparently are organisations which have successfully taken this route.

Workshop Reports

Harassment

This workshop looked at the main fears of harassment which lesbian and gay teachers have, and compared them to our experiences and the experiences of our friends and colleagues.

From this we tried to create the basis of a document to give guidance to teachers either faced with, or concerned about, harassment from pupils, parents, school management or colleagues. Examples of the latter were by far the most common.

It is hoped that a final version of the guidelines will be ready sometime in the new year.

Women

This workshop discussed a great number of issues raised by the women who attended. Among other things, it was decided to start up a telephone network for lesbian teachers. Phone Sue on 0171 635 0476 for details.

Equal Opportunities Policies

This workshop talked about good practice in equal opportunities and what, from a lesbian & gay perspective, should be in them.

It is hoped that School's Out will be publishing a model policy based on the ideas generated by the workshop.

Good Practice in USA, Canada and New Zealand

Alex McLead reports: In a well known San Francisco high school, a drama class in Grade 9 - equivalent to year ten - acts a play in a which a young man tells his father he is gay - but it's twelve plays really, because the coming out scene is played twelve different times with a different outcome each time. In one, Dad says, "That's great son, so am I." In another, Dad dies of a heart attack.

When we feel discouraged, sometimes, because lesbian and gay issues are virtually invisible in our school curriculum, it's good to find exciting ventures in other countries. There are plenty if you have time to seek them out.

In this workshop we read the 'coming out' play. Some were keen to try it in their schools, but others thought it included too much violence. We looked at an excellent programme for the whole of the state of Massachusetts. It has powerful official support. We also discussed workshop material, on coming to terms with all sexualities, from New Zealand, where the age of consent for all is 16, human rights are protected and many schools use these workshops.

The city of Toronto has organised one of its schools as a place where young gays and lesbians are welcomed and encouraged. Is there such a school here?

Life After Kingsmead

Sue Sanders from the Kingsmead Support Group and Jane Brown led this workshop which sought to draw positive lessons from the experiences of the staff of an ordinary inner-city school suddenly pushed onto the front pages of a homophobic press.

There was a lot of agreement that a repeat of such viciousness was less likely given the way that the school community stood up for their head. There was also some relief that most parents at the school had put Jane's abilities as a head before the issues of her sexuality.

One thing was very clear. There is much that lesbian and gay

teachers can do in schools to counter homophobia, but the transformation of our straight colleagues, of our unions and ultimately of the law is also needed to properly protect us and to make real antiheterosexist teaching a reality.

Images of Masculinity

Debbie Epstein led this workshop which looked at the links between "normative" masculinity, homophobia and sexism, drawing both on case studies and on the experiences of the participants.

What is clear is that homophobia and sexism cannot be effectively countered without challenging masculinity as it is constructed in our schools and wider society.
