Do you think vegetarianism/vegenism is built up to be more important than it really is needle think that once they've become vegans, they've done all they can do?

Simon: Well, it's a step in the right direction to stop eating meat and so on, but we shouldn't forget that there are humans who are suffering worse, in some cases, than anisals, and they should be gatting our attention and we should be pushing for their advancement.

Simon: If you try and get to a wider audience, Mr and Mrs Average are interested in the susic not the lyrics. You might look at the lyrics as an afterthought but that's not what they're after, they just want a good tune. If they like your music they'll dance to it and look at the lyrics and say "oh that's the words" but they won't think about it. I mean Grandmaster Flash was in the charts in '82 - he had pretty wacky lyrics, and everybody just danced to it and thought "this is a good song" but nobody thought about what he said.

Rob: But things can't be significantly changed by staying outside the system because only by going into it are you going to maset other people and might change their views. If you stay outside the system all the time, you're always going to stay with the same kind of people and you're not going to influence anybody else.

Simon: Well would you like disco boys going to your gigs?

Rob: No, no, there's other people apart from disco boys! Tou also get your normal kid who's not like that but he hasn't heard the views yet. How are you going to get across to him if it's all within a small group?

Simon: Most people by the time they're 19 are stuck in their views and they won't change. So if you're an anarchist when you're 19 you're likely to stay that for the rest of your life. And if you're a complete pret by the time you're 19 you're likely not to listen to snyone else anyway.

What do you think of the Nelson Mandela concert, Live Aid etc?

Rob: The idea might have been there in the first place but it's totally shit because after live Aid it's a fact that all the bands who went on it - they may have gone on it to support it, but the fact is that their record sales rocketed up after it. And also, to play they had to get permission off their record companies, so the record companies only allowed them to play because they knew their record sales were going to go rocketting up. It's the same for the Melson Mandela thing as well. The bands might have wanted to play anyway but the fact is that their record companies will only let them play if they're going to get something out of it, and the only thing they're going to get out of it is more money and more record sales.

Your lyrics are not as political as they used to be, was this a conscious decision?

Not: The only non-political lyrics we've ever done are two on the single and one, "The Sun is Shining" is political if you look into it. "When the North Wind Blows" isn't a political song, it's just a song. The thing with doing political lyrics is that just about everybody else we play with also does political lyrics; so we try and and put it across in a different way. We are a political band but not as in Chumbawamba, I mean we don't stand up and make statements. And the night I wrote those two songs, I like doing something different.

Simon: As to his lyrics - I have to admit that I am very distremed with the lyrical direction with which Feed Your Head are texing!

What are your views on the drink/drugs scene within punk?

Simon: It depends on how you react to drink.

Rob: Simon's sitting here with a bottle of cider and he's just finishing it off at the moment:

Sison: I have to admit I am a person reknown for drunkeness but when I'm drunk I become a nice, friendly person who wants to talk to people, but not everyone's like that. Some people when they're drunk start wanting to fight, but I think most of those people are nightclub dickheads:

Rob: And when he's sober he sounds hard on the phone;

Simon: Anyway, I think that within our particular scene, drink is a good thing towards social cohesion. People within the scene, when they drink, want to be friendly, and there's only a minority of idiots who want to go around fighting or causing trouble. Bost people become really nice when they've had a few drinks.

Rob: Shall I put my point of view? I am not of that opinion: I don't drink a lot myself and I think that people should be able to enjoy themselves without drinking.

Simon: I can emjoy myself without drinking, but I emjoy doing it, bos it's more of a laugh. The thing is when I've had a few drinks I can think up ridiculous lines of conversation that I'd never think up beforehand, like talking about Peruvian temples and stuff, and get people to actually talk about it. Whereas otherwise they'd just any "this guy's a nutter";


Rob: And druge are stupid.

Simon: There's nothing group with drugs. I hate hard drugs but cannabis is CK. Hard drugs - I think they ought to put poison in them so everyone who takes them dies!

Because they're just prats for taking it in the first place. I mean it's only a social position. like me, if people said "you'll be a really great guy if you do this" I'd rather say "fuck off" and be a complete reject than actually do it. Like when I was at school, if you didn't do certain things like be a disco bey, you'd be a complete reject. I said fuck off I don't want to do it, and I got through alright.

Do you think things can be significantly changed by staying outside the system? If you played to wider audiences, perhaps more people would take notice?

Rob: Well we wouldn't classify us as an anarchist band. We may agree with a lot of the views but we wouldn't class ourselves as anything. As soon as you classify yourselves you're sort of in a rut. And the majority of anarchist bands around now are really shitty and just make a lot of noise. And half of the stuff that I hear that's called anarchist music is just exactly the same as what people were doing in 1979. It just come across as a noise, you don't get a message across.



Although Clause 28, preventing the promotion of homosenuality by local authorities became law on 24th May 1988 I think it's worth relating the events of the London Stop the Clause march on 30th April. In fact it's even more important now after Clause 28, to speak out for lesbian and gay rights, in order to counter the anti-gay feeling the Clause will encourage.

Firstly, this seemed to me to be an important march to support, such blatent erosion of human rights is not something we can afford to be complacent about. Mether you're gay or not, if we let the government get away with Clause 28 (now Section 28) then it paves the way for further repression. And although I's not gay I feel it's important for me to express my apposition to the Clause and the general homophobic attitude of society. Maybe it's even more important for me to express my gay/ issbian friends that they have my support and to show everyone else that I'm not prepared to sit back and see our liberty takes from us. Gay rights are human rights. An injustice to one is an injustice to all.

The demo itself seemed to go well, the turnout being estimated at 50 000 (or 15 000 by police reckoning, human...) I got the impression though that we were largely kept away from places were we might actually be noticed by the general public, some pavements were fenced off and only some serious looking police watched.

But as a means to show our commitment to gay rights and our unity and strength I think it was successful. A more direct, confrontational approach would possibly have got more results (and more press coverage, what happened to that?) but then again wouldn't have had the mass support of the march. More "radical" action seemed to be limited to chucking the odd can or glass around along with a choice anarchist slogan. Something similar to abseiling into the house of lords or invading the BBC would have been appreciated. Where was the imagination?

Probably the best part of the whole day was messing around on Kennington Park at the ralley where everybody congregated to listen to speakers and bands. The rain held off (which was surprising as I thought James Anderton might have sorted something out with God) and we had loads of fun playing silly games and mixing with famous popstars.

After the railey was over it was good to see so many people join in to help clear up the litter (which of course needn't have been drapped in the first place). All in all it was a worthwhile day, even if you doubt the effectiveness of marches, it must be bettor to go clong and give your support than stay at home and mean. You might even make some new friends.


Manchester 'Punx Picnic' - Saturday June 4th 1988



we could ignore it and hope the rich, ignorant and greedy people will stop it and change it for us (I don't think we have that long);



CHUMBAWAMBA

What priginally provoked you into thinking about the world's problems and what inspired you to start Chusbawamba?

<u>Danbert:</u> I think we started before we really thought about the world's problems. I don't know what starts people thinking about the world's problems - probably everyone thinks about them but you don't notice they do.

Boffo: I think at first our conception of the world's problems was that it started and ended with the music scene. When punk happened and bands like the Pall were saying things that we thought were really daring - what we would call political - they were really cynical about everything and we thought that was great, so we ripped them off for a while. That probably led us into thinking that there is more to the problems of the world than just the limited view that we had at time.

To you ever feel that you're natronising people by trying to 'enlighten' them?

Anffo: No - I don't think we're trying to enlighten people. It's more a case of mutually finding things out that other people have done. We're just putting it together and singing it in the hope that other people will then go off and find out their own thing. We try our best not to be really moralistic about things. We always add humour to it, we're never really straight-faced and pioused about everything. So hopefully it doesn't come across as if we think we've got all the answers, because we know we haven't. We've got some of them for ourselves but we haven't got any answers for anybody else.

Your heliefs include things such as vegenism. Cemiminism and pacifies, but do you think you can single one out as being the most important?

Dantert: No. I think what made us think of becoming politicised was the Falklands war and so then the thing was the peace movement and anti-war. But as we've gone on it becomes more obvious that single issues are a bit of a dead end really, because they're all interlocked. It's not just as simple as veganiss. People could say that if everyone were vegans then everyone would be respecting life; and there would be no more problems, but there's a lot more to it than that.

Well why did you become vegans?


Boffo: What, now we've just slagged it off?:

Dunst: We jumped on the bandwagon I think!

Do you still get people wondering what you get and how you survive without meat and dairy products?

Dunsi: Yeah - the bloke in the shop down the road asks us every day when we go in and buy something! But I think it's good when people ask us.

Boffo: I think it's sad that veganism is becoming bought up by the capitalist market place. It's sad that instead of going to a wholefood shop to buy things that have some semblance of 'okayness', it's a lot easier for people to go to Safeway and buy so-called 'vegan' food, or even organic fruit and vegetables. It means that with the whole scheme of things, veganism isn't going to change that, because it shows how easily capitalism can take over




CHUMBAWAMBA

Why do you criticise bands like the Housemartins and Rilly Bragg?

Boffo: I think the Housemartins and Billy Bragg are different. I think Billy Bragg's got a lot more credibility than the Housemartins. What the Housemartins say in their songs is brilliant but I think that the reality of the Housemartins is that they make a lot more compromises then their lyrics would suggest. I read an interview with them where they were asked about the peace convoy, and the answer they gave was so ignorant that I just thought how can they be representing socialist politics when they were saying things. Like the peace convoy should dress more smartly if they want to be part of society. The fact that Billy bragg does benefits all the time is really good. It's just that a lot of theses left-wing musicians seem to have a fetish with shaking hands with Neil Kinnock. So we might not be totally anti-Billy Bragg, but we're certainly anti-Neil Kinnock.

Munat: I'll never forget that picture of Billy Bragg stood with scabs during the miners' strike. It's just the political pop front of the Labour Party. He was using the Labour Party and the Labour Party were using him, to further both their careers. But I suppose he's done a lot of really good things,





tion do you hope to get your views across to new people, other than those who already agree with them?

Danhert: I don't know - we don't plan and think we're going to get certain views across to certain people. It's just a natural thing wanting to express something about what's going on other than the banal crap really. There's this phrase touted about 'preaching to the converted', but I don't think it exists really because we don't regard ourselves as being converted. I think our audience has changed a lot over the years. They are mainly young people, but we get some older people coming in now.

Boffo: Dan's mus and dad have come to a couple of our gigs, and Dan's dad's a meson and he likes us - so obviously he can't hear the words!

What do you think of the mainstress music press?

Roffo: Crap! It's good because there's a gig guide - that serves a useful purpose.

Dunst: I think we were once quoted as being the band who went down to the local newsagents and read the susic papers in the shop, so we didn't have to buy them:

If you were asked to do an interview for Smash Hita, would you agree to it?

Boffo: I think if we could guarantee that we could see the interview beforehand, then we'd probably think about it.

Dunst: I'm sure that Smash Hits has the same amount of integrity as Sounds, NME, and Melody Maker anyway.

Boffo: The reason we've done interviews with Sounds and NME a few times is not because we think the paper's trustworthy but because we know the people that do the interview. We knew James Brown when he worked for Sounds and we know Steven Wells who works for NME. So we've got a fair idea of what they're going to write and what they think. And we've obviously made a conscious decision to accept that they're not the kind of people that are going to go off and totally misquote us and things like that. But I don't think we would do it if it was just someone from the Guardian or whatever and we'd no idea what they were going to write. So I don't think we would do unless we could get a copy of it before it went in, and had the power to say whether it went in or not.

What other things do the band symbers do spart from being in Chumbawands?

Panbert: A lot of down to earth stuff, like we've just decorated the house, fixed the roof, sanded all the rust off the ven!

Cobie: Sit down in the kitchen and talk about AIDS.

Boffo: Some people have part-time jobs and some look after people's children, and everybody does either writing, painting or drawing. We're also involved in a lot of political groups, like prisoners' support groups is something that Dan does - just by writing to prisoners and trying to send in books and things like that. There are things where suddenly we'll all get involved in something, like we used to go out hunt sabbing a lot. Danbert: And then when the miners' atrike happened we went out collecting so we didn't go out sabbing.

Boffo: Anti-Pascist Action is quite a relevant thing at the moment in Leeds and people have been leafletting outside football matches against racism and fascism.

Do you think that playing gies serves a useful purpose other than just entertainment or do you think that your booklets etc are more effective?

Dunat: I think they're all part of the same thing really, booklets and gigs.

Danbert: I'd like to think that we serve more than just entertainment. I suppose for me,
I got interested because a lot of my inspirations come from songs that people have done
at gigs. It's just that feeling of, not reassurance but there's just some kind of feeling
there, and it's just some kind of communication.

boffo: I think there's always a feeling at gigs where if it's a benefit gig and there's stalls there, and people are singing about things that make you question things, and there's leaflets going around, you get a much stronger feeling out of that than if it was just something that was purely entertainment. It can be a really strong thing.

Danbert: And on a really practical level like raising money for whatever.

Deffo: We played this gig last night and it was good because there was a Nicaraguan stall and all that mort of thing and lots of posters up, so people knew what the gig was for. And even though s lot of people might have just gone because they thought 'year there's three bands on, and it's only whatever it was to get in, let's go along', and then the bloke who organised it said they'd reised over £200 for the Nicaraguan Solidarity Campaign and someone explained what the money was going to go to. And even if I wasn't involved in the gig, I thought it's been really worthwhile that the gig's happened because we've seen all this stuff that's going around and we know that the money you've paid to get in its doing something really useful. And that's probably more important than the playing the guitar bit.

Have people ever said that your gigs or literature have made them question society?

Boffo: Yeah, lots of people. We've had some abusive letters as well. I don't know about 'questioning society' but people might say that they've thought about something or got involved in something because they've heard it in a song, which I think is fair enough, because that's what we all do.

Danbert: Sometimes people ask us 'do you think you're being effective' or 'how effective are you being' and you can't possibly gauge it at all, so all you ever know is what you feel about it, whither you're getting something out of it, and whatever people might say to you. But the people who come and talk to us are probably a really small proportion of

the people who see us or hear us. But I know for years I went to gigs and I never sort of went up to a band and said 'I thought you were inspiring' or even 'I thought you were mod' - I just never did that. I do now though.

hoffo: Yeah, I never said at all. Of all the bands that I ever saw that really made me think about things, or just that I thought were brilliant, not just bands, but anything, theatre or whatever, I would never consider going up to them and saying that they made me think about things.

If you didn't get any feedback from your sudience would you still carry on?

Danherts I don't know. There's always some kind of feedback, even if you're just doing entertainment. I mean that keeps it going, the feedback.

infin: I suppose it's so easy to recognise that there is some kind of feedback even if it's not just people coming and saying something to us. When we first started trying to research things about Thorn EMI and what they were involved in as a record company and as an arms manufacturer, it became easy after about a year - you started to see lote of things that included the same information that we'd found out, and the people had obviously learnt it and gone out and found out things for themselves. And nobody came up and said 'I think it's really good what you're saying about Thorn EMI', I mean they probably did think about it, and that's just one way we get feedback. But I don't know whether we'd carry on or not.






