

On Thursday May 7th I gave a talk on CHE and answered questions about gay life and activities for about two hours in S.E.Derbyshire College of Further Education. The group concerned was made up of 29 nursery school nurses and two lecturers. Three of the nurses had elected to do a project on Homsexuality. Besides the talk they had a questionnaire which brought forty replies from passersby in Wheeler Gate one lunch time. Save one, the reactions of the nurses was favourable as were the bulk of replies to the questionnaire. It is possible that we will receive the actual forms used to make our own assessment though the size of the sample is so small as to make it of passing interest rather than anything usable.

On Monday June 1st a demonstration of Karate as self-defence has been arranged for members of the gay community between 8-9pm at ST.George's Church Hall, the Meadows. Class membership and times will then be arranged. The eventual cost will be £1 for a $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour session per week. Although eventula membership of the Karate Union of Great Britain is a requirement at £5/annum, this will not be necessary for a couple of months, by which time it should be clear to individuals whether they wish to continue. David Rigby and his wife who run the classes are both Black Belts and David seems very welcoming to the notion of classes for gay men and women under potential threat. He tells me that the classes can be adapted to the individual so that age and relative lack of physical fitness should be no barrier. Karate suits can be supplied through the association at $\pounds10$ (in the shops they range from £18 to £25). However, here again for beginners there is no need to have them and payment terms for the unemployed can be arranged.

As a sporting activity and a social occasion the formation of such a group has much to commend itself besides the spreading of skills in self-defence among gay people. I hope that many of you will take full advantage of the classes. Although full-scale training is the best form of defence both practically and psychologically, it may be possible to arrange a short course in street fighting for those unwilling to undertake a full training in Karate.

Arrangements are being made about an attempt to re-book the Teachers' Centre, which we hope will be successful in view of the new administration.

A number of cottaging cases under the Public Order Act are known to be taking place and there remains a possible commitment to fight one of them through Appeal should the accasion arise. Members who come across such cases should urge the individuals to contact group officers to see if we can help them in this.

Nationally though there is no immdeiate campaign, the decision in the John Saunders case may require action shortly. Otherwise the work of gathering information is of vital importance and members who have information for the three commissions on Employment, Medicine and Prisons should not fail to write direct or through me to the officers named in the CHE Broadsheet.




A GRANMA BY POST



On the basis of Tim Barnsley's letter in the last issue the N.W. convenors did not oppose the Manchester march, they merely "did not recommend it". There is a difference. Marches and rallies seem to have two effective uses. On the occasion of a specific act or acts of oppression they serve to focus opinion. I note that the CHE National Executive is supporting the transfer of the Gay Pride March to Huddersfield in this connection. The other purpose is consciousness raising among the participants, a kind of political masturbation which can be fun, doesn't send you blind but is not everyone's ideal. Marches are only one possible tool available to the Gay Civil Rights movement. I enjoy them occasionally but I doubt whether they convert the unconverted. Traditionally in British politics they have largely though not exclusively, been a tool of the radical left and are associated with confrontation politics. CHE contains elements. drawn from the whole political spectrum of British politics and probably the majority are apolitical. There are still many valid and valuable campaigning contributions to be made. Information gathering and dissemination through letters, pamphlets and speaking engagements; reports to Royal Commissions; financial and other support for test cases before courts at every level, these activities and many others in which CHE is massively engaged and which take up the bulk of time are more likely to achieve the permanent changes in social attitudes which are the ultimate aim even beyond equality before the law.

It is a long, tedious and frustrating business to change the ingrained prejudices of millenia. Similar campaigns in the past against slavery, child exploitation or the criminalisation of religious non-conformity have suffered from similar difficulties. Their success, so great that the struggles are all but forgotten, is a good foundation for our hopes. In the meantime the march with banners "Stop Gay Oppression Now" is a valid release for individual frustrations and occasionally politically useful, while the real work goes on. I feel that many 'thinking gay men and women' will agree with me and continue to give their support to CHE.

That said I must admit that as Tim has stated in meetings, there is a grave fault in the lack of serious discussion among members about gay issues, our opinions on what it is or would mean to be gay. Information about our enemies should be balanced by correct information about ourselves. Also, however difficult, our present political situation locally is relatively easy. It could change so that confrontation is our only alternative. I do not think that CHE members would be the last to the barricades. No doubt Michael Demi-Tasse would raise the Faubourg Sainte Anne and from the closets would come the scarves embroidered with the arms of Anderton, Whitehouse and Pole-Carewe. But for the present this seems a time to gather stones together and a time to speak so that we are perhaps not so much a campaign as a mission.

As Campaign Officer of the local group I would very much like to be informed if this view is totally unrepresentative of the opinions of members.It's not my impression that it would be.


