


And that goes for university people who consider all 'townies' as thick, townpeople who hate students, or the Art School lot who look down on everybody. Instead of catering for any one of these groups specifically, we decided to make a magazine that would enable anyone who felt they had something to say to do so. The only major constraint would be that they keep their articles reasonably simple. We asked this not out of any sense of superiority, but because this magazine goes out to a wide range of people, from different cliques. So, for example, there would be little point my printing an article on 'Anarchy and the social construction of reality' since only a handful of people, mostly all from the university, would understand it. This is not because the other people who read this magazine are thick, but because they havent been studying the philosophy of science for three years. Thus our intention not to make the magazine elitist necessarily entails the need for simplicity in articles. Point made.

Furthermore, our dislike of snobbery entails that we do not ourselves presume to be able to judge, in any real terms, other people's work. In otherwords, if somebody gives us something to print which means something to them, then (in all probability) we'll print it, irrespective of whether or not we personally like it. False Head exists for people to express themselves.

We say all this because reaction to the first issue was on the whole markedly polarised. Either people loved it or hated it. Now all the hostile criticism tended to take a similar form - the standard was too simplistic and naive. Fair enough, we can accept criticism. We NEED constructive criticism. But the thing that made us so very, very sick was that not one of those people who were hostile towards last issue gave us anything constructive to put in its place. Not one of them said 'What you printed last issue was crap, print this instead'. None of them gave us anything.

Now bearing in mind what was said about False Head being a platform for anyone I can only draw two conclusions. Either these people (and they know who they are) are indescribably stupid to the extent of entirely missing the whole point

of the magazine, or (and this is probably more often the case) their minds are so choked with the vomit that is their own cynicism and sarcasm that THEY HAVE ABSOLUTELY NOTHING LEFT TO SAY THEMSELVES. They think they're SO superior, huddled together in their cliques for protection and indulging in head-wanking whilst thinking they're being profound. Well they've just shown themselves to be so many empty shells.

We'll try just one more time though, this time we'll keep it nice and simple just for them - if you think the articles in this magazine are crap, then write one yourself. False Head can only be as good as YOU make it. If you have anything constructive to say, then say it. If not, then keep your mouth shut.

STIFF LITTLE FINGERS (NOT REALLY)



- Il. Freedom to exercise choice or personal priority in spending and from oppresive, unnecessary or confiscatory taxation.
- 12. Freedom from coercive monopolies.
- 13. Freedom to engage in private enterprise and pursue the trade or profession of one's choice without harassment.
- 14. Free lom of choice in the use of State and private
- services (including education and medicine).

 15. The Right to protection from invasion of privacy.

They mean that wealth, once unfairly distributed, will remain so. They mean the continued development of the coercive manopolies they claim to be against. They mean the development

and sanctity of an elitist, Fich group. And this has the futher consequence of making some people more equal than others. Does a worker really have as much droice of occupation in life as an employer? Yet they claim to be for the freedom to engage in the profession of ones choice — inherently incompatable with some of their other aims. And who are the countries enemies? — those who are incompatable with the elitist group's boisness interest; they're not my enemies. And so on...

The NATE is a right wing organisation interested in maintaining the existing status quo. It is headed by buisnessmen and other elitists in their own interest. The only freedom they are interested in is their freedom to continue to exploit you.





Noclear Power - do we need it? This country is slowly becoming more and more committed to Muclear Power. The main reason for its growth is because in the not too distant future convention energy resources such as coal and oil will begin to run out, leaving an 'Energy gap'. This gap will be tilled by thulear power. Futher reasons held by the government (though not published) are that with Muclear power the nation's energy programme will be based on a few sites which in a time of crisis (war or internal unrest) can be easily guarded and prevented from falling into the wrong hands. Finally there are large

Industrial interests based on the programme. It is seen as a potential source of a great profit by buisnessmen and politicians.



O The satety hazards are evomous. There have been inumerable near disasters, but lucking so Far no real oner. Muclear fower is still experimental, effects of radiation doses are very clear, and if a disaster did occur it would will thousands of people and radiate the surrounding area for many years.

@ Nuclear waste which cannot be reprocessed (made so that it can be reused) remains radioactive for a quater of a million years. As a result it has to be reparated and stored and remains a potential hazard for many generations.

3) Nuclear power used for energy produces a by-product, plutonium, which is used to produce Atomic Bombs. England's winducale reprocessing plant will reprocess waste for other countries and retorn it to them, this waste will include the

plutonium. Many of the countries we will reprocess for are not yet in possession of Muclear weapons, but with Phutonium will be just a few days away from becoming so.

@ Due to the danger of Atomic plants and the risk of Hudeat power stations and anywhere else handling materials are guarded by a special police force who are armed. Fither these police have special powers to arrest on suspicion. The more we become committed to Nuclear power, the greater the threat to civil Rights.





I haven't taken much seriously: as a child I stuck out my tongue at the poor women who accosted my mother in the street to ask for airs and on the sly I pinched their brats, who were already weeping from the cold; When my dying father wanted to confide his last wishes to e and colled me close to his bed, I seized the maid, sin ing 'Your parents will have to be tricked - you'll see why it's you to love I picked ... Wherever I could betray a friend's confidence, I don't think I lissed the chance. But there is little merit in jeerin at kindness or ridiculing charity, and the surest way of having some comic relief is to deprive creatures of their little lives - without any lotive, just for lau, s. Children don't deceive themselves, they know how to enjoy the pleasure of throwing an ant hill into panic or squashing two flies surprised in the act of cogulation. During the war I threw a grenade into a shelter where two comrades were getting ready to go on leave. What a peal of laughter at y mistress's terified face when, as she waited to receive a careas, I slugged her with my America right hook and her body fell several feet away; and what a sight, those people? who struggled to get out of the Gaunont-Palace after I had set fire to it !

But batight you have nothing to fear, I have taken it into my head to be serious.

Obviously there isn't a word of truth in the preceding takes - I as the bestbehaved little boy in Peris - but so often I have delighted in imagining that I
had accomplished or was going to accomplish such honourable exploits that it isn't
completely a lie either. And, anyway, I have scoffed at quite a few things!

Only one thing in the world I have never succeeded in cooffing at: pleasure.

If I were still capable of shame or self-respect, you can well believe that I
would not be able to bring myself to such a ainful confidence. Another day I
will explain to you way I never lie: one has nothing to hide from one's greants.

But let us return to pleasure, which promises to overtake you and, with two little
notes of music, vin you over to the idea of skin, and many other ideas as well.

As long as I do not overcome the taste for pleasure, I well know that I shall be susceptibl to the into ication of suicide.


The first time I killed myself it was to amony my istress. That virtuous creature brusquely refused to sleep with me, caying that she was overcome by remorse for betraying her first-string lover. I do not really know if I loved her - I suspect that a fortnight away from her would have singularly diminished my need for her - but her refusal exasperated see. How to reach her ? I killed myself to annoy my mistress. I am forgiven this suicide in consideration of my entreme youth at the time.

The second time I billed syself it was from taziness. Poor, and having an anticipatory horror of all work; one day I killed syself as I had lived - without conviction. They do not hold this death against he when they see how blooming I am today.

The third time - I will spare you the recital of my other suicides provided you will consent to listen to this one more - I had just gone to bed after an evening I during which my boredom had been no ore overwhelming than on other nights. I remember very clearly that I made the decision and, at the same time, pronounced the sole reason. And then ZUT! I got up and went to look for the only weapon in the house, a little revolver which one of my grandfathers had bought and which was loaded with bullets as old as the gun. (You will see in a ovent why I stress this detail.) I lay down maked on my bed. It was cold, so I hastened to bury myself under the covers. I cocked the hammer. I felt the cold steel in my mouth. At that moment it is likely that I also felt beart beating, just as I felt it beating when listening to a shell before it excloded - in the pressuce of something irrevocable but unconsummated. I resend the trigger, the hander clicked, but the shot didn't go off. I then said by wearon on a sall table, probably laughing a little nervously. Ten linutes ster, I was acleep. . I think that I just made a slightly important remark, but... of course It goes without saying that I did not for a coment dream of fixing another shot. The important thing was that I had made the decision to die, not whether I actually died. were to Look a few vest was to by thest will be

A man spared by bores and boredom perhaps finds in suicide the accomplishment of the lost unselfish jesture, provided that he is not curious about death! I have absolutely no idea when and how I could have thought that way, which in any case mardly troubles me. But there, all the same, is the lost abourd act, fantasy at its explosion, and unconstraint by ond sleep and purest coloro ise.



DADA SPRANG TO LIFE DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR, EVENTUALLY EFFECTING MANY MAJOR CITIES IN EUROPE AND AMERICA BY ITS SHOCK TACTICS. It was born in zurich, which, being a weutral city, became an alive centre of Dissidents escaping military service from various Different countries. The futility of the war, the attitude of the masses and the Elitism of the art world were the central beliefs of a very mixed crown of artists.

THE MOVEMENT BEGAN IN A CAFE - THE CABARET VOLTAIRE - WHICH

THROUGH ITS INITIAL CABARET ACTS ATTRACTED THE DIFFERENT ARTISTS ALTHOUGH ESSENTIALLY ANTI-ART, ANTI-THE-BORGEOISIE, ANTI-ACCEPTABILITY, 17 COULD BE DESCRIBED AS ONE OF THE MOST CREATIVE MOVEMENTS OF THIS CENTURY. ITS ACTIVITIES INCLUDED SUCH THING-S AS SIMOUTANEOUS ADETRY, WHERE BY SEVERAL ARTISTS WOULD RELITE DIFFERENT POEMS, OFTEN IN DIFFERENT LANGUAGES, AT THE SAME TIME. THERE WERE ALSO BIZZARE MUSICAL SESSIONS, POETRY READINGS PLAYS AND RIOTESS PARTIES. WHILE THERE WAS THIS EXPLOSION OF ACTIVITY ON ONE SIDE OF THE STRET AIMED AT TOPPOLING THE BORGEOISIE, LENIW WASONTHE BPOSITE SIDE PLANING THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION.

ARTISTICALLY THE MOVEMENT STRIVED TO BE UNACCEPTABLE. INTRODUCING NEW ELEMENTS TO RIDICULE THE ART WORLD. FOR EXAMPLE THE IDEA OF 'FOUND OBJECTS' WHEREBY AND ARTIST CHOSE A PARTICULAR OBJECT AND NAMED IT A PIECE OF ART — A HAT STAND, A LOC ENTITIED 'FOUNTAIN' SIGNED RITUTT, A SHOVEL WITH THE MAXIM 'IN A DUANCE OF A BROKEN ARM! BUS TICKETS WERE COLLECTED AND MAPE INTO COLLAGES. WEWSPAPERS WERE OUT UP AT RANDOM TO MAKE POEMS, PAPER WAS TOEN AND DROPPED AT RANDOM ONTO A SURFACE AND FIXED THERE. ALL THIS, AND MORE, WAS AIMED AT RIDICULING ART, BUT IRONICALLY IS NOW VERY ACCEPTED AS SUCH. IT WAS NEVER MEANT TO BE ART, BUT ANTI ART.

IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE WAR DADA GAVE WAY TO A CON-STRUCTIVE, AS OPOSED TO DESTRUCTIVE, DOVEMENT - SUREALISM . IF YOU LIKE CLICHED PARALLELS TRY THAT BETWEEN PADA AND PUNK
FOLLOWED BY SUPEALISM AND NEW WAVE, DADA EXPOSED AND ATTEMPTED
TO DESTROY THE FUTILE SOCIAL VALUES EARLY IN THIS CENTURY, BUT
DID NOT OFFER A CONSTRUCTIVE ALTERNATIVE. SURREALISM WAS THUS A
POSSIBLE LOGICAL CONCLUSION, FILLING AGAP OPENED BY DADA.







I do choose what I buy fairly carefully, not just because of the money or lack of it; mainly because there's alot of crap about, and the visual appeal of some singles sleeves bears no ralation to the contents. Still, what the fuck, singles are only£1, what's a quid these days, I mean, 187 I've seen crap bands loads of times for £1. I've seen good bands on a bad night for £1. Section 25 (Sexions) have never dared to charge more than 50p for a gig, but when I look at my own reactions to crap gigs I never feel I've wasted my money, so maybe other people feel, roughly the same way. What counts is hearing live bands, local bands. People spend so much money on imported music, what have kids in Blackpool or Lancaster got in common with American disco music manufactured in some studio thousands of miles away by people they'll never see or hear live? The answer is....nothing. We're all victims of the machinery that helps us form our opinions and tastes. It just seems to have got a little out of hand, disco LARRY fodder can be an apt description sometimes.
