But many gay men are being told wrongly by doctors, that they are not sufficiently at risk to warrant being given the injections.

"I urge every gay man to go to their doctor and ask first to be screened and then for the vaccine if they need it", said Dr. Elizabeth Fagan, a lecturer at Europe's leading liver unit at King's College Hospital, London.

She claims that many doctors are ignorant of the fact that a vaccine exists and feels that it will only be generally prescribed when people ask for it.


"It costs the NHS much more in health care than it does to prescribe the vaccine", Dr. Fagan

Many men who do not want to 'come out to their GP's have asked for the vaccine at their local sexually transmitted disease clinic. But they can only refer patients back to their GP's, because the cost comes out of the hospital budget.

Aids specialist, Professor Adler and other leading experts have called on the government to provide funds for a programme that offers vaccination for 20,000 gay men.

An immunisation programme on this scale would cost around £4 million, according to Professor Adler, but might save £20 million in the cost of treating victims of the disease.

The vaccine, which takes 65 weeks to prepare, protects people at risk. It is no good for those already exposed to the virus. It costs £75 for a course of three injections but is available to gay men through their doctor for £2.20, the cost of a prescription charge.

AIDS: Workers to be appointed


Nottingham will soon have two new workers to help cope with the growing AIDS crisis. An AIDS Liasson Officer is to be appointed shortly and a second consultant in Genito-Urinary Medicine (V.D.) will join Dr. Chris Bignell (who heads up the General Hospital V.D. Department in Postern St.), later this financial year. One of the jobs the workers will face is liaising with other Nottingham voluntary and statutory groups that are likely to be undertaking AIDS-related work.

Meanwhile Nottingham AIDS Information Project has now received its full Health Authority grant, after some earlier hiccups, and begins a new publicity drive under the theme "aids Concerns Everyone". Add to this hearing impairment - deafness - and you're dealt a double blow. But this has not deterred several deaf gay groups around the country from organizing social events together.

This feature is reproduced from Mancunian Gay who visited the Manchester-based Triangle Club.

Triangle Club is a group of deaf lesbians and gay men based in Manchester. M.G.

went along to one of their meetings. This particular evening they were enjoying a meal upstairs in the Rembrandt with mem bers of Central Rainbow, a similar organisation based in the Midlands.

The group, which until recently was known as Kings and Queens, has been going for about 3 years and has members from all over the North West including Huddersfield, Chester and Blackpool. The gay scene does not often provide a good place for deaf people to communicate with each other so the Triangle Club is a valued place to come to for support as well as to have a good time.

We spoke to Colin from Central Rainbow who said that there group was now involved in helping to run the new Lesbian and Gay Community Centre in Birmingham. And he also told us about the support the London group had received from the G.L.C.

The Triangle Club has recently received a £400 grant from the City Council's Equal Opportunities Committee and they are hoping to use the money to publicise the group more and contact deaf gays who may be unaware of the group's existence. They also hope to make the gay community more aware of the existence and needs of deaf gay people. For the discrimination facing them is very severe Most events and meetings still do not have signers or lipspeakers. Unly a small percentage of TV programmes are subtitled. And work is especially hard to find, and many members of the group are unemployed.

But perhaps the main problem is the attitude of able bodied people who seem



The group meets on the second Friday of every month in the upstairs bar of the Rembrandt and also organises other social events and contacts. There is increasing contact with similar groups in other parts of the country, Brothers and Sisters in London and Central Rainbow in Birmingham. And Mervyn, the group's secretary is hoping the club will expand and that more deaf gays will get in touch and realise that there is a place where they can socialise, make friends and enjoy themselves.

Although there are more gay menthan lesbians in the group women are actively involved with the club and there is a woman member who lesbians can contact with any specific problems.

to think that if you are deaf you must be daft as well and who therefore act in a condescending and patronising way towards deaf people. By thinking more about our own attitudes towards deaf people we can begin to make the gay scene more welcoming to a greater range of people.





Two South London lovers walked free from Kingston Crown Court last month after an ordeal which lasted 11 months. Their acquittal from a charge of gross indecency came after three days in court. "It was a simple matter of who the jury chose to believe, us or the two police constables," said Neil Brown. "It wasn't a case of where the police could have been mistaken or innocently misinterpreted what they saw," said his lover of three years, Scott Mackintosh. "The two young constables who arrested us thought that they would have an easy conviction if they picked on two obvious gay leathermen and simply cooked up their statements together after they had returned to the police station. It was nothing but lies from beginning to end." "And even after they had spent hours together writing the statements and had months to learn them off they couldn't get them right when cross-examined by our barrister in court," said Neil.
