


"SILENT PIONEERS" Channel 4, 22nd September (30 mins)

Picture 300 elderly lesbians and gay men at their weekly social bash. This is 1986 and it's New York Senior Action In a Gay Environment (SAGE). We are eavesdropping on oral histories of the 30's when these black and white lesbians and gay men lived out their lives, passing for straight, contending with the usual hellfire and damnation. A black grandmother humourously recalls the thunder and lightening that befell her when she could no longer live a lie, and the eventual surprise and obvious acceptance voiced by her grandaughter on film, when she realised that her gran and Sharon were, in fact, longtime lovers. The aged waitress who felt that she lived in a foreign country, but had now "come home" to the lesbian centre and a niche as an ironic, agitprop singer too. The lesbian with parkinson's disease, who recalls in quivering voice how she first wrote the word "lesbian" in her diary then tore it out only to find it days later, staring up at her from the floor of the family home, realising that it was the first time she had actually named herself. The two gay lovers, 50 years on, and still very clearly in love.

This film is undoubtedly a major highlight of the Channel 4 season, only spoiled by the often inaudible questions of the interviewers, making some of the responses weaker. In our youth-orientated culture, this is vital viewing, long overdue. For these determined, lively elders wont lie down and fade quietly away. We should celebrate that their retirement is only a passing phase. I shall no longer fear growing old. RICHARD Mc.CANCE







***** PRIVATE MATTERS' **** Now we're set for the demo. on the 25th October (you'll have seen it in the press, and leaflets will soon start to flutter), we might as well face that thorny old problem: DONT ROCK THE BOAT. SEXUAL-ITY IS A PRIVATE AFFAIR. DEMAN-DING SPECIAL TREATMENT WILL ONLY MAKE THINGS WORSE. We're right to want to be left alone. But how private is our sexuality as far as the Police are concerned? Customs? and Excise? Teachers? Employers? the Sun, the Star and the rest? As gays, we're under constant and increasing public attack. In that sense, we're already getting special treatment, and want it to stop. I think we need to take a public stand to protect our pri-vacy. That's why I'll be on the demo. on the 25th.

But there's one homosexual man who wont be. He's very powerful at County Hall, and has consistently been opposing equal opportunities for lesbians and gays. It seems to be that he's frightened of losing some of his power, if sexuality gets on the agenda. Somebody might just ask him to stand up publicly for their rights. very much oppose suggestions that he should be 'exposed'. We must defend the right to privacy of all gays. Most people have a tear of hospitals, of being prodded about by doctors without being told what's happening. Add to that the fear that you might just have "something not quite nice a sexually transmitted disease, commonly called "the clap", and you have a recipe for fear which can build up. But how the hell do you tell a perfect stranger that you've just had sex with another man?

I wondered what a clinic firsttimer would feel as he entered. We always seem to remember past bad experiences, never the good ones. It's understandable then, to feel a little cautious at least.

But I need not have worried, for one thing Dr. Chris Bignell is no stranger to Nottingham; he studied here and has worked in London and Leeds where he was a Senior Registrar before returning here to the General Hospital as Consultant-in-Charge of the Sexually Transmitted Diseases Clinic. Over the years he has gained a wide knowledge of some of the medical and social problems gay men encounter, making him familiar with the London and provincial gay scenes.

Recent visitors from Leicester were Just-A-Phase Theatre Company with their show, Overcoming Homosexuality - Confessions of Two Deviants". The one-night show at the International Community Centre was a sell out and well received. Directed by _ Jo Docherty and Kafo Ade, it featured third-year performing arts students, Dar-ren Brady and Jamie McCarthy. The show featured autobiographical material and traced the adventures of two gay men in their fight against prejudice and bigotry leading up to their eventual coming out.

At the outset the Edinburgh Fringe Festival organizers, realising they had a gay play on their hands, tried to cancel the company's contract, but Leicester Polytechnic threatened to withdraw three other entries for the Fringe if the show was cancelled, and the Fringe organizers backed down. The company now plan to video the show as a permanent record of their work, before moving on to do other things.


