

Nottingham C.N.D. is entering its fourth year of campaigning, albeit under a different name from when it commenced. So far we have achieved a great deal in as much as the government is extremely worried by the growing support for C.N.D. and was forced to abandon the farcical 'Hard Rock' exercise. One thing we haven't changed yet, and I doubt that we will, is the way the automatons of Whitehall and the House 'think'. The powers that be are doing their utmost to discredit the peace movement, mostly by lying, but unfortunately a great deal of people believe those lies, and until we mount our own anti-anti-campaign, people will continue to believe.

Three years ago the peace movement witnessed its own metamorphosis and has been developing ever since. Emerging from the womb of post Vietnam and civil rights movements, C.N.D. has severed its umbilical cord with the intellectual element, encompassing a wider spectrum of the population, and learned to stand on its own two feet. So far, so good. We have built the campaign to include at least 50% of the country, now we must think in terms of how we can make use of this support. Nonviolent Direct Action immediately springs to mind, or perhaps it seeps osmotically into the old grey matter. We have had marches and film showings galore but now our whole way of thinking has to change in respect of the type of activities we organise. I don't wish to pre-empt the activists conference, therefore I'll leave you with the thought 'less organic, more dynamic'.

WHO DARES WINS???

A LESSON TO BE LEARNT

The film Who Dares Wins has been showing at a major Nottingham cinema since November last year. For successive weekends members of the Forest Fields Peace Group have been leafletting outside the cinema in opposition to the loaded political content of the film which blatantly attempts to discredit peace movements in general and C.N.D. in particular.

This trashy film gives a ficticious account of how the S.A.S. tracks down a terrorist faction, which has infiltrated C.N.D. in order to pursue its murderous, violent strategies. But more importantly "Who Dares Wins" attempts to convince the cinema-going public that C.N.D. cannot be trusted, that it is at the mercy of extreme left wing organisations. It implies that C.N.D. is a tool for foreign subversive powers which manipulate the campaign for anti-British purposes. But most significantly the film serves to try to persuade people not to oppose nuclear arms policy - that retaining a nuclear arsenal is the only sure way of retaining world peace.

Clearly any form of action against the film had to be inconspicuous enough not to attract it extra publicity. But the F.F.P.G. also felt that this war propaganda had to be opposed and therefore decided to leaflet and talk to members of the public as they entered the cinema to see the film.

The success of this action was unqualified (barring a few threats and police interruptions). In excess of 100 people decided not to see the film once they learnt what it was about. But more importantly the exercise provided an opportunity to talk to people about the broader issues of nuclear arms policy, to listen to what arguments and ideas they produced and to counter or match them withour own. And people, in the main, were keen to talk.

There is little point in hoping that C.N.D. will grow stronger and carry more weight unless the present series of assaults on the campaign are resisted and opposed.

Every day on the press we read reports of politicians attacking C.N.D. from all sides or editorial lines blatantly trying to undermine the peace movement. Recent events events have indicated that the Govnt is increasingly worried by theswelling ranks of C.N.D: the imprisonment of Greenham Common women, the withdrawal of John Pilger's film "The War Game" and the new pledge for multilateral disarmament being only three examples. Unless these attacks are positively resisted then there is little chance of C.N.D. growing.


Equally, taking the nuclear debate to people, confronting people with the issues at stake and talking, debating and arguing has got to be one of the principal activities of all members of C.N.D. It is futile to hope that by ignoring anti-C.N.D. propaganda it will sim ply disappear. Inviting people to share their views on deterrence, Cruise, Trident and Civil Defence is the most significant way of exerting influence, winning arguments and attracting new members. And this has to be achieved if C.N.D. is to grow and have some chance of attaining its goals.

That was the lesson of leafletting "Who Dares wins": that people are prepared to talk, to debate and to listen to others' points of view; that the personal contact of sharing views is one of the most motivating factors for people to become involved. People are, without choice, involved in the nuclear arms issue. The choice, and the decision we must urge people to make is do you want to be actively involved in trying to get rid of nuclear weapons or do you prefer to be a passive victim of them?





Beeston Anti-Nuclear Group applied to hold a bookstall in our Square one Saturday in November - one of the few not taken by double-glazing firms. The Planning and Development Committee "decided" to refer the question of political groups in the Square to Policy and Resources as it had never arisen before...Not unexpected, really, so we co-operated by showing them samples of literature and both local and national constitutions to prove (not at all conclusively) our non-party status. We also wrote another letter of explanation to be read to the P&R committee meeting.

So three of us turned up on the evening ready for almost anything but the misinformation and muddled thinking we heard. For a start, the Chair refused to read out our letter as it was "not relevant" - they were only discussing Policy. They then proceeded to dicuss

A prominent Councillor (no prizes for guessing which party controls Broxtowe Borough Council, by the way) asserted that we are affiliated to the Labour Party, later admitting to us - outside the meeting - that he had no proof and had said it to make sure that we were refused because he feared we would be too effective. Others stressed the right of the "normal" public to shop in peace (!) and that the Square was for commercial use - never mind that we wanted to sell our stuff!

On the other side it was argued that Parties should not be allowed (quite right!) but pressure groups should not be limited in their right to free speech in public so long as good order etc... Of course it didn't succeed but it did teach us that we should have briefed our supporters on the council and generally been better prepared.

They "decided" to set up a working (!) party and then adjourned for coffee - not bad for 40 minutes and maybe 30 people. Democracy in action, and how.

Since the original date has long since passed we have applied again and await developments with bated breath. We are also going to lobby the working party and keep the issue in the press - good reports in the Trader, Recorder and Post so far, the latter without any contact on our part. We might use it in any local elections too.



THE BLACK AND WHITE MIS-SILE SHOW: this array of models of Soviet and American missiles, purporting to show that the Russians are ahead in the missile race, is being used by the Pentagon to justify President Reagan's decision to go ahead with the new MX missile writes Ian Mather.

But the message it conveys-that over the years the Americans have built only four types of missiles (painted white) whereas the Russians have or are producing 13 types, many of them larger—is misleading.

First, all these missiles are landbased. Both superpowers maintain a 'triad' of land-based, submarine-

based and aircraft-based strategic nuclear weapons. The Russians have 72 per cent of all their strategic missiles on land, whereas the Americans have only 24 per cent: 25 per cent of US strategic weapons are based on bombers and no less than 51 per cent on submarines.

Taking strategic forces as a whole, there is a rough balance. The Soviet Union has more delivery systems (approximately 7,000 against 6,920 American) but fewer warheads (about 7,300 against 9,268 American) because the Americans are more advanced in the art of multiple warheads on single missiles.

In addition, the model gives the Americans the benefit of the doubt over which missiles are included and

which are left out. It does not show two earlier versions of the Minuteman, which became operational in 1963. On the other hand, it does include the Soviet SS-16, banned under the SALT 2 agreement, never deployed by the Russiains, and believed to have been a complete failure in tests.

The line-up also ignores cruise missiles, thousands of which will be deployed in a strategic role on American bombers, ships and submarines.

The Russians have also tended to be less successful at getting their missiles right first time and have had to develop several different types. The Americans, on the other hand, have stuck with the successful Minuteman and continued to develop it.

NOTTINGHAM CND WELCOMES SOVIET PEACE INITIATIVE

"The Soviet Union...have suggested an agreement renouncing all types of nuclear weapons - both of medium range and tactical - designed to strike targets in Europe... (Alternatively) The USSR and the NATO countries reduce their medium-range weaponry by more than two-thirds...We are prepared, among other things, to agree that the Soviet Union should retain in Europe only as many missiles as are kept there by Britain and France - and not a single one more."

The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament has learned, over the years, to be very dubious of the 'Peace initiatives' proposed by both the USA and the USSR - more often than not they are mere propaganda, and will never be put into practice.

Hoever, this latest Soviet proposal (as quoted from a Novosti Press release detailing Andropov's December 21st report to the Communist Party of the Soviet Union) seems far too good to ignore.

It seems incredible that both the American and British governments' official responses to this have been out-of-hand dismissal of the Soviet proposal. Do they think the Soviet proposal is too little or too much? Can such a dismissal really be in keeping with representing the best interests of the American and British peoples?

No! The ever increasing frenzy of the arms race, which has created a highly unstable and unbalanced 'balance of terror', has brought us close to annihilation. One mad general or one computer error could cause hundreds of millions of deaths, and any attempt to stabilize the situation must be snatched up.

CND wants all weapons of mass destruction - nuclear, chemical and biological - BANNED. The Soviet proposal is only one small step in that direction, but at least, if genuine, it is in the right direction. Perhaps the officials who are negotiating at Geneva do have trouble trusting each other; perhaps the Soviet proposal is not genuine; but at least the Soviet proposal can now be used as a basis for serious negotiation. Any step, however small, towards reducing the massive nuclear overkill of NATO and the Warsaw Pact has got to be in the interest of all the people of the world.

Nottingham Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament will continue to raise awareness about these issues. We will show Mrs. Thatcher that it has become politically impossible to accept Cruise missiles.

C.D. REGULATIONS

NEW CIVIL DEFENCE REGULATIONS - THE BACKGROUND

In July 1982, Home Secretary William Whitelaw announced the "postponement" of the civil defence exercise "Hard Rock" which would have taken place in Sep/Oct that year. The reasons given were the lack of co-operation of Nuclear Free Zone local authorities coupled with the apparent apathy of many non-N.F.Z. authorities and the claimed limitations of the existing regulations to force local authorities compliance with civil defence preparations.

Mr Whitelaw is now trying to close the "loopholes" by which local authorities could refuse to comply with government policy by amending the Planning Regulations under the 1948 Civil Defence Act. These new regulations are being hastily pushed through Parliament and will likely have been debated and in force by April, but there is no intention of allowing local authorities a chance to see the draft regulations before they come before Parliament.

In attempting to justify civil defence, the government has tried to discredit objectors by calling them "inhumane". However the degree of commitment and cynicism of this government towards an effective civil defence policy can be measured by the fact that, despite a supposed expansion programme plus the avowed intention of forcing councils to comply with preparations, the nationwide funding for all such defence projects will only be £13 million next year (i.e. less than 25 pence per person).

THE NEW REGULATIONS

Local authorities will not have an opportunity to properly comment on the composition of these regulations before they come before Parliament. This is in sharp contrast to previous procedures. Instead of a draft, a superficial consultation document has been circulated by the Home Office which gives little hint of the actual details of the new regulations.

The most important expected changes in the regulations are below, though of course it should be emphasised that these have been gleaned only from Whitelaw's speech and from the Home Office consultation document.

GOVERNMENT POWERS

In future the Home Secretary or the Secretary of State for Scotland will be able to give individual councils specific directions on how to carry out their duties. Failure, or refusal to comply with a directive would then allow the government to take over the job and charge costs to the defaulting councillors.

COUNCIL EMPLOYEES


A previously unused provision of the Civil Defence Act (Section 5) will be used to compel any local authority employee to take part in training and any form of civil defence recognised as appropriate to their normal work.

WARTIME HEADQUARTERS AND EQUIPMENT

For the first time local authorities down to district level will be expected to provide suitable wartime headquarters and to equip them with "communications and other equipment necessary to the effective operation" of such headquarters.

VOLUNTEERS - VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

County and regional councils will be obliged to plan for the use of "civil defence voluntary effort" in war, as well as arranging local peacetime training and exercises for volunteers. The effort that will be put into the wooing of organisations such as St. Johns Ambulance Brigade and the W.R.V.S. as as yet difficult to assess.



FINANCE

Most local authority civil defence functions are presently grant-aided at the rate of 75%. Under the new regulations further 'approved' local authority civil defence expenditure on training and exercising staff and volunteers, on H.Q.'s and provision of related equipment will be completely reimbursed.

However, before we start congratulating the government on this supposed upgrading of civil defence potential, we must remind ourselves that "directions by the Secretary of State will have the effect of containing performance of local authority civil defence functions within a total expenditure of about £13 million a year".

IMPLICATIONS OF THE NEW REGULATIONS


- 1. The new regulations make severe inroads into the democratic autonomy of local gowernment in favour of political policies imposed centrally, using the power of law.
- 2. Even more sinister than this is the degree of conscription which may be imposed on local government employees without recourse to contractual stipulations and without prior consultation with their unions. This means that people will be forced to co-operate with the government's sham war plans whether they agree or not and is a further escalation of the militaristic thinking which attempts to pervade our everyday life.
- 3. More than this local authorities are being compelled to plan for something without official information on what they should be planning for. The Home Office is evasive as to the projected scale or effects of a nuclear attack, has failed to make public any detailed study comparable to the recent one by Scientists Against Nuclear Arms and C.N.D. (which estimated 40 million deaths in Britain), and attempts to blur the distinctions between a nuclear attack and one using conventional weapons.
- 4. District councils are also conscripted and have similar responsibilities placed upon them as upon county authorities a further assault on local democracy.

CONCLUSIONS

Now, as ever, it must be stressed that C.N.D. opposes Civil Defence preparations for WMX XX a nuclear war in a nuclear weapons state because there can be no realistic preparation for it. S.A.N.A. figures estimate that 80% of Britain's poulation will perish in the event of nuclear attack. Civil Defence is therefore a complete fraud. It consists of building one-man observation posts and bunkers for the privileged and rich. There is no defence plan for you or me.

C.N.D. opposes this government's stance on Civil Defence because it is an attempt to delude the nation that such a war could be survivable, thinkable and fightable. Britain has many nuclear weapons. It would not have them unless it was prepared to use them. The new Civil Defence regulations are clear evidence that the Government is actively planning for their use. And that will be the death of us all.





National Council spent most of the weekend of January 15 & 16th sorting out the mundane bureaucracy of the campaign, including budgets, the composition of committees, and the priorities for paid workers.

However, items that deserve

special mention are -

-Support for a 5 day blockade at Upper Heyford (financial and organizational assistance is to be available from CND).

-YCND can affiliate to CND for just £5 which means they will be fully represented at the next Conference. Also YCND reps are to be entitled to sit on Regional CND committees to try to ensure that YCND effort and CND effort are more mutually complementary.

-Student CND are forming a human chain from the Ministry of Defence to the Dep't of Education and Science on Feb 12 (highlighting the education cuts connection with increased armaments spending).

-CND National Raffle will shortly be launched with a (donated) MG Sports Car as first

prize.

-A General Election Strategy is being prepared and a lot of ideas raised at Council are going into a comprehensive CND Information Pack. The major effort in the runup to an election should be the 'Peace Canvas '83' which will make the connection in people's minds between their vote and the disarmament issue.

-There will be a mixed sex blockade at Burghfield at Easter and
a women's blockade at Greenham.
There will also be a human
chain link up between Greenham,
Burghfield and Aldermaston.

PUBLICITY/PLANNING/ELECTION MEETING

A representative from each neighbourhood group (hopefully willing to commit the group to doing some work) would be very welcore at this meeting -FEB 3rd 7.30pm at the NCND Office.

THE GREENHAM PLEDGE -BATTERED BUT NOT BROKEN:

It was extremely unfortunate that nothing came of the 'Greenham Pledge' at CND National Council. Council did not allow sufficient time to properly hammer out an acceptable policy on the Pledge. The one posit-

ive proposal that was presented was deemed unacceptable, and, despite Conference's approval, was voted out. (Very Unconstitutional!)

The proposal did indeed have various weaknesses. No provision had been made for a possibly necessary escallation of the campaign from peaceful picketting to NVDA blockading. The proposed Pledge was also planned for a limited time and was somewhat inflexible regarding when it could be launched - and these were weaknesses. But most of all the Pledge fell because the women at Greenham hadn't been given a say in the planning.

Helen John of the Women's Peace Camp spoke against. Having talked to Helen afterwards, she is still concerned about men getting involved at Greenham. She also thinks that Greenham is

successful enough already.

However, what Helen, and some other people at National Council do not realize, perhaps because they are far removed from the general CND grass roots support, is that Greenham is the centre of our immediate battle. The Greenham Cruise deployment is imminent. Whether rightly or wrongly, it has become the Mecca of the Peace Movement and almost EVERYONE seems enthusiastic to help in someway at Greenham. And so -
