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

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
The third in a national chain of ethical grocery stores opened in Beeston last month. Heralded by the Sunday Telegraph as 'the most radical experiment in retailing for 150 years', Out of this World is the first chain of stores to offer products which have been specifically chosen to help customers 'shop for a better world'.

Out of this World is the brainchild of Richard Adams, who is the former founder and managing director of Traidcraft and the magazine New Consumer. 'There are a large number of people in Britain who want to make positive, ethical choices about the products they buy', explained Richard Adams.

All of the products sold demonstrate a concern for one or more of five key issues environmental sustainability, animal welfare, community development, fair trade and healthy eating. Food takes up the majority of shell space, but there is also a wide selection of household goods and other products.

Product details are available around the shop, and on a user-friendly information system called 'Worldly Wise'. Customers simply bring products to the information point and swipe the bar-code across a scanner.

A screen then brings up everything that you need to know to make an informed decision about what to buy.

Out of this World is a consumer co-operative, which means that its customers are also its owners. Richard Adams is determined that customers, or members as they are known, have a real say in what products are stocked and help shape the company's policies on topical and local issues.

Membership will be just £5 for life, but a free three month trial membership is also available. More than just a store, Richard sees Out of this World as a focal point for the local community committed to ever higher social, environmental and ethical standards.

The Nottingham shop is situated on Villa Street in Beeston, immediately opposite Sainsbury's. There are excellent parking facilities, and it is easily accessible by public transport.


* Living on the Leading Edge, of challenge and out from familiar excitement; breaking finding creativity boundaries, and empowerment.

Environment Watch is a way of getting people involved in caring for the place in which they live. The idea is that local people should be able to have a positive impact on their surroundings, since they know about their own locality.

FOOD MILES -**MENU OF MADNESS**

Food miles come in two varieties - the vast Theoretically the UK could be self-sufficient in food, if we were to adopt new patterns of distance between the country where produce is consumption, particularly eating less meat. We grown and where it is eaten, and the mileage would probably continue to import some foods built up within countries as food is packaged, out of season, but many of these could come processed, stored, taken to distribution centres and then on to the shops. from nearer at hand, such as Europe.

BIRD CRISIS ALERT

NETWORK

Eight leading conservation organisations have joined forces to review the plight of the UK's birds, and have issued a warning on 36 species which are giving serious cause for concern - of which 13 occur in Nottinghamshire. Many of the 36 species have halved in numbers in the last 25 years. The list contains a disturbingly high number of common but rapidly declining farmland birds, including the tree sparrow (down 89% over the past 25 years), and the skylark (down 58%).

The species are listed in an up-to-date review, 'Birds of Conservation Concern in the UK, Channel Islands and Isle of Man', prepared by the RSPB, the British Trust for Ornithology, Birdlife International, the Hawk and Owl Trust, the Game Conservancy Trust, The Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust, the Wildlife Trusts and the National Trust.

Changes in farming practices like the move from spring to winter sown cereals, the loss of hedgerows and use of pesticides have all contributed to the decline of farmland birds. Others have suffered declines or have very restricted distribution because of habitat loss some are increasing with better protection and habitat conservation, but are still rare.

Dr Mark Avery, chair of the Birds of Conservation Concern Working Group, said 'The fate of bird species acts as a barometer of environmental health. There are now more than twice as many species which are rapidly declining than there were 10 years ago.'

Proposed action ranges from individual species


Launched on 3rd April, REAL WORLD is a coalition of 32 campaigning groups who believe that the problems they confront are caused by the UK Government's failure to acknowledge the costs of the modern global economy, halt the abuse of the environment and reform our out-dated democratic system.

The organisations include Friends of the Earth, Oxfam, Christian Aid, Charter 88, Women's Environment Network, Black Environment Network, and Transport 2000. Between them they claim 2 Million supporters.

This is not an attempt either to create a new political party or to influence the outcome of the next general election. Instead, the coalition has agreed on a 12 point agenda, which it is urging all of the major political parties to adopt. The REAL WORLD agenda includes -

- An integrated transport programme to reduce road traffic by 10% by 2010.

and habitat recovery programmes to large-scale changes in government policy. Resources must be directed to those species, habitats, sites and policies where most conservation can be achieved.

- A strategy to increase consumption of fresh and nutritious food.

- Promoting an enforceable international code of conduct on arms sales.

One of the prime movers of REAL WORLD is Jonathan Porrit (a former general secretary of Friends of the Earth UK). He says 'every single REAL WORLD organisation believes that success in achieving its own goals depends in part on all of REAL WORLD's goals being addressed. For instance, there can be no long-term protection for the environment without reducing and finally eradicating poverty both here in the UK and internationally'.
