## £1000 for AIDS Group

The Nottingham Aids Support Group is appealing for volunteers to tackle the growing amount of work now that the group has set up its own office in Central Nottingham. Nottingham Area Health Authority have given £1,000 towards initial running costs. Lesbian and gay rights campaigners scored a major victory at the Labour Party Conference in Bournemouth when delegates passed a resolution with a 600,000 majority, committing the Labour Party to a positive action charter demanding that all laws discriminating against lesbians and gays should be scrapped. It also supported an age of consent of 16, to bring into line with heterosexuals. The charter will include an end to discrimination against lesbians and gays in child custody cases, prevent unfair dismissal at work and called for an end to police harassment. It also called on all Labour Councils to enforce positive employment policies for lesbians & gays.

## LABOUR COUNCILS URGED TO ACT

In proposing the resolution, Sarah Roelofs, said she was proud to be a lesbian and that so-called crimes of lesbians and gay men were crimes without victims. When Gays the Word Bookshop was raided and when gay men were entrapped by the police, lesbians and gays alone were the victims.

"An ex-Labour MP told me that the Labour Party should be building the new Jerusalem, not Sodom and Gomorrah. I want no part of your Jerusalem unless you include us," she said, to thunderous applause. A Labour Councillor John Davis, said he was not gay but was a human being. "...And decent human beings do not spit on people's love, like Tory councillors in Barnet who refused to accept a cheque for a charity, donated by the Gay Bereavement Gp."

Theresa Conway, thanked all those heterosexuals who had campaigned alongside us, before gay rights was a popular issue.

Set in Skegness between the years 1945 and 1982 and spanning two wars, (the end of World War Two and the Falklands) the central character is Nigel, an only child who lives with his parents on a council estate at the edge of town. Around him are his parents, Rita and Bernie; his friend Janet; Rita's sister Barbara; Carol and Nina, an elderly man and woman who befriend Nigel. Growing up, discovering sexuality and the nature of friendship are the themes. Bernie's past comes back to haunt him when Nigel meets Carol and the reasons for the father's bullying attitude to his son become clear. Fear of sexuality, attempts to hide aspects of our lives and repress aspects of others lives have (as often in life) disastrous consequences. The programme is aimed at the fifteen plus age range.

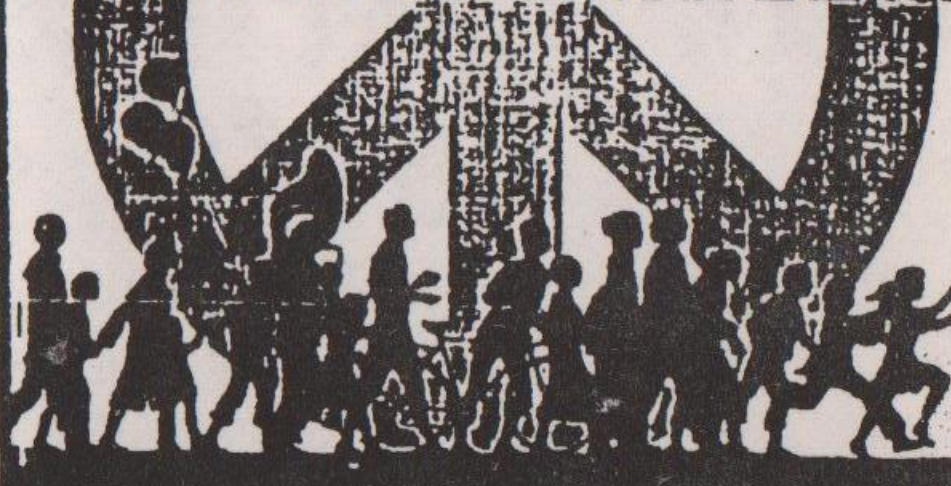

# AT THE MINISTRY FOR GAY RIGHTS 2001

One of the least controversial decisions of the new government has been the setting up of a Ministry for Lesbian and Gay Affairs.

Mancunian Gay went to interview the new Minister for Gay Men in his luxurious office in the heart of Whitehall.

**Minister, what do you think are the main reasons for the advances gay people have made over the last 25 years?**

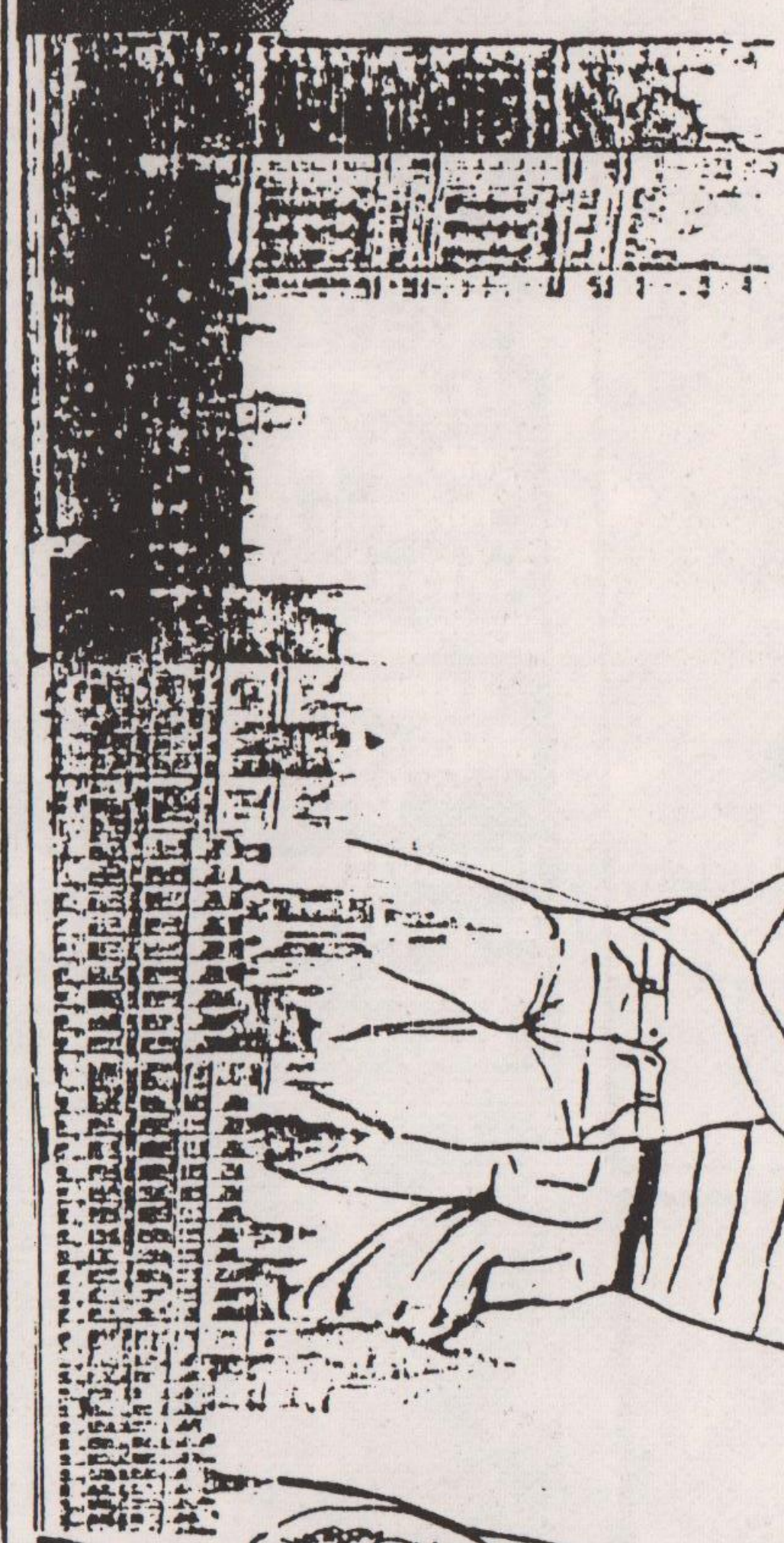
Several things spring to mind. The growth of the Gay Youth Movement in the late 1980's produced a major shift of opinion. Suddenly there seemed to be thousands of young gay people who were no longer prepared to put up with any discrimination and who seemed to know exactly what needed to be done to change things. For example there was the famous case in 1988 of the Southampton Secondary School where all the pupils joined their Gay Group to prevent it from being closed down.

This in turn created the atmosphere where Parents of Gays became a major force in the Gay Movement. They were keen, if inexperienced at first, and as heterosexuals no one was quite sure how to respond to them.

I remember the first time Granaries for Gay Liberation disrupted the House of Commons disguised as a pensions lobby to demand an equal age of consent. Until then it was easy for the media to say that we were a bunch of extremist faggots and dykes with no support. But saying they were all Marxist Lesbian grandmothers was too much, even for the popular press.

Another important reason was more public figures coming out. By the 1980's there were a few MP's and pop stars saying how much better they felt being open about themselves. And then it snowballed, suddenly there were gay support groups in Buckingham Palace, the TUC and the House of Lords. And in

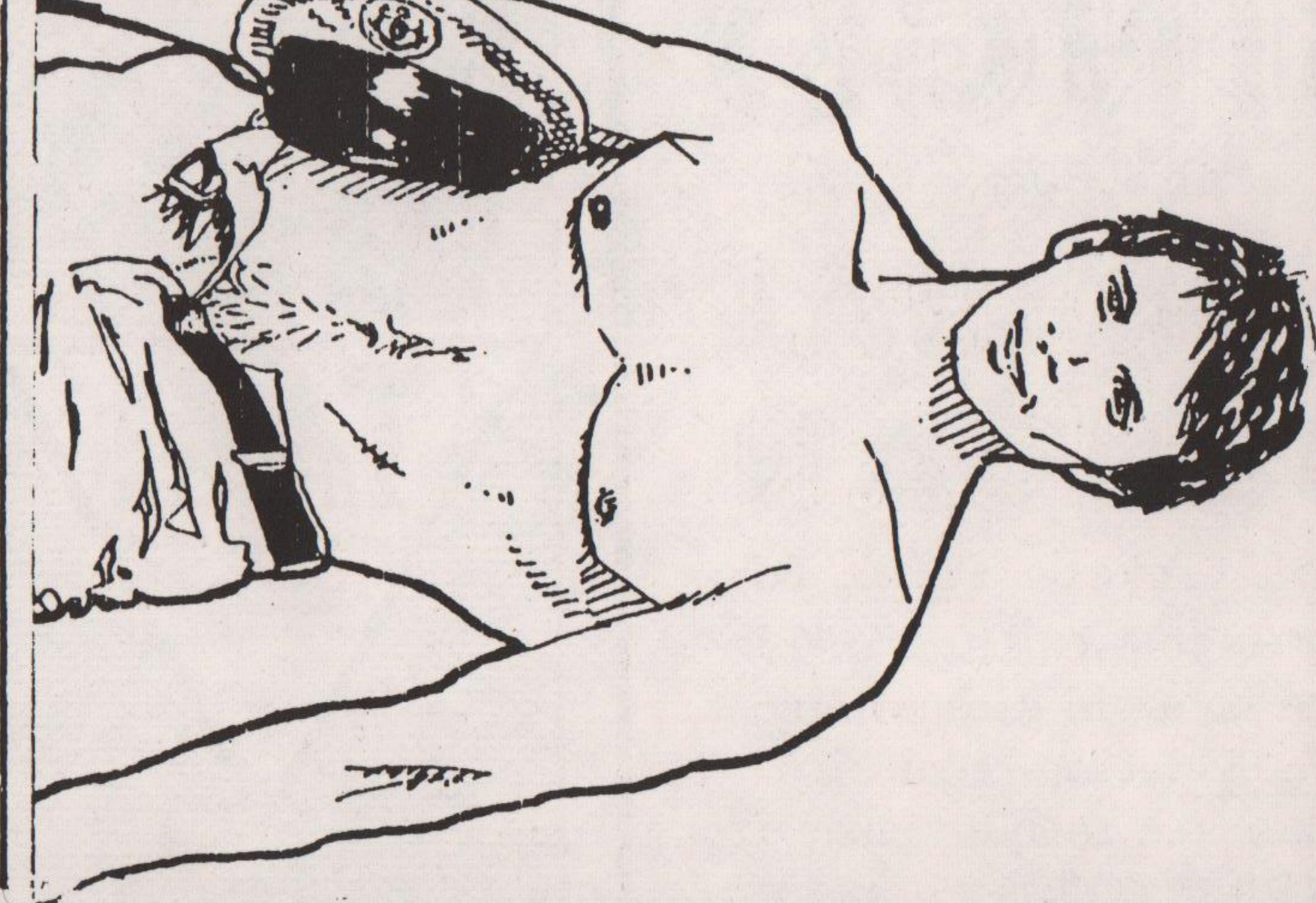

**What are your main aims for the next 25 years?**

There is still a lot to be done in rural areas. Most towns now have a range of gay services but many villages still have nothing. Several parish councils are at the moment experimenting with old time gay disco dances one night a week in the village hall. And the Government is publishing a White Paper soon on Gay Men in Rural Communities. Integration not isolation. Our aim is to provide as much support for gay people in rural Essex as we do at present in central London.

Another important area is more difficult to pinpoint, its changing the assumptions that people carry around with them. We used to say that everything would be better once we had positive images of gay people in the media. Well we've had our own television channel for the last 15 years and there's still a long way to go. We won't have completely finished our work until every single person in



the country never again assumes that anyone is heterosexual.

**How confident are you of the support of the Government?**

Extremely confident, for the first time we have several openly gay and lesbian members of the cabinet. There is a real understanding of gay rights and a commitment that the resources we need will be a significant proportion of our overall budget.

The Prime Minister, and her lover, opened the purpose built £1 million Hereford Gay Centre last month. Both women were presented with small bouquets by two young men from the Hereford Gay Venture Scouts, who were watched by their adoring parents. The Prime Minister, wearing a fetching pair of purple dungarees with matching hat, christened the Centre with a ceremonial can of breaker.



## WATCH OUT THERE'S A COP ABOUT!

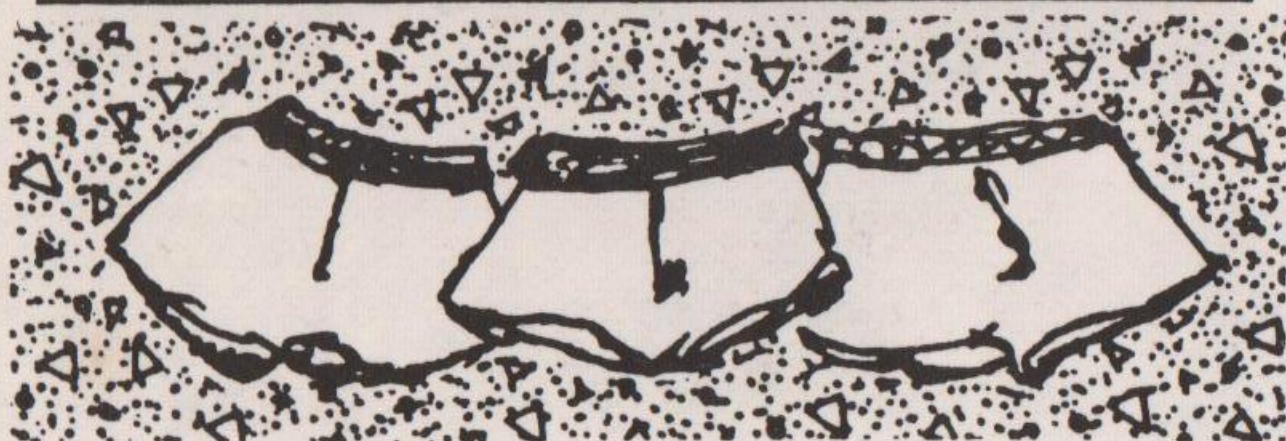
Police are again using agent provocateur tactics in several toilets in Nottingham, particularly at Mount Street Car Park and the Victoria Bus Station. One man reports seeing the 'pretty police' hiding in the attendants room, sending out a decoy, propositioning someone known to be gay and then arresting their victim. So the next time you are propositioned, beware.
