organisation behind it was most impressive.

It started Friday evening with a public debate on various Gay issues. On the platform were local politicians (left and right), representatives of the churches and a judge to name but a few. It was attended by about 300 people and was very lively. Saturday morning saw a Gay Pride March through the streets, followed by a rally in the main square. The organisers called it a demonstration, which it certainly was but it also managed to achieve a carnival atmosphere. There were about 500 marchers, not many you might say but could you imagine 500 Gay Men and Lesbians marching through Nottingham?. It was interesting to note that there were very few police present and what there were seemed only to be there to control the traffic chaos the march caused. In the afternoon there was a press conference with myself, representatives from France and Switzerland in attendance. Saturday evening saw a huge party from 7pm until 3am. Part of a conference centre was hired and there was a bar (ofcourse) food available, a disco, a caberet and two Gay Theatre Groups, some party!.

After the party I staggered onto a train and headed back to Nottingham, wondering why Nottingham or for that matter any other major city outside London does not have such a Gay Festival.

The Metro Cinema is in Green Lane, about fifty yards down from the Gallery. No prizes for guessing where I'll be going for my pre/post-film drink!


The Green Lane Gallery's support for the Derby Gay community was further illustrated recently by a 'mag' sale which raised £16 for Gay Switchboard.

On December 3rd last year a lesbian and gay conference was held in Nottingham with the participation of the City Council to discuss the possibility of a lesbian and gay Centre being set up in Nottingham. From various other meetings with the council it became clear to many of us that whilst the council were prepared to give us their verbal support they were unable to guarantee any money. Few people became really involved in this campaign so that the few women and men actually trying to negotiate with the council soon lost heart and did not have the energy to continue.

But for many lesbians in Nottingham the conference provided a positive starting point for an increase in lesbian unity here. This and a lesbian workshop at the women's festival provided the basis for a new lesbian group which has been meeting regularly ever since.

On Monday evenings at 7.30pm there is an open leabian social meeting at the Women's Centre. This usually incorporates discussing any matter that someone feels is our concern, e.g. a coming social event. We also have a meeting every other Wednesday to discuss the Lesbian Centre.

As some of you may know, the Women's Centre are hoping to move to much larger premises on St. James's Street. Within this large building the rooms will be allocated to the various groups who wish to use the centre. At an open viewing of the building many lesbians came to see the building because it had been suggested that we might ask for a large space within this building to be our own Lesbian Centre.

Without trying to draw a plan I shall attempt to explain what the Lesbian Centre would consist of. There would be a beautifully light open space, probably half as big again as the top room at the 'Hearty', which could be user as a coffee bar and general daytime social meeting place. In the evenings the regular discos could happen with a pool table and general drinking facilities. We could also have a room that could serve as an office for the general administration and a library of lesbian literature. We would also have seperate offices for Lesbian Line.

At the moment, of course, this is still all at the planning stage. Also, when we first move in we will not be able to use all the space that I have described above. Some of the other groups may have to borrow space from us to start with because of all the building work and alterations that will have to take place in other parts of the building. But eventually it will be the Lesbian Centre as described above. We are also hoping to get some financial support from the council as the Labour Party manifesto expressed a commitment to helping lesbians and gays.

If any of you want to help get this venture off the ground, please phone Lesbian Line and they will give you details of the relevant meetings.

I look forward to seeing all of you there.

The group NASTY HABITS came about rather more by accident than by planning. It all, started in the winter of 1983 when the Morrigan Lesbian Housing Co-operative were planning certain events to make Christmas an extremely festive occasion. We thought we'd have a pantomime with certain songs being performed to illustrate the story. Anyway, to cut a long story short. . . . it never happened. Instead the three of us decided to go out carol singing to raise some money for the Christmas booze.

After Christmas we - that's Jo, Trina and Sarah - that we wanted to carry on. So we started to learn new songs - anything that we could sing in three-part harmony that was either apolitical or which had a slant that suited our own politics and sexuality.

We soon decided that some accompaniment would not go emiss and so we decided to ask Liz if she would be willing to join us. That's when we made really our first move into original material - Liz had already written some songs which we found suited our talents admirably. Last but not least I (Jo) met Ruth at the Poly Women's Group. Not only did she have the required credential of being a Lesbian, but she could also play the 'cello which we thought would compliment the band nicely.

Since those early days, six months ago, we have discovered that amongst the five of us we have a multitude of talents and potential to develop some more. Three of us have written songs which we perform, three can play bass guitar, three can play the piano, the 'cellist plays the bongos (not simultaneously), one of the members is making a valiant attempt to learn the saxophone (she provides ear plugs on request) and we all sing.

All this basically means that we are a sound engineer's nightmare. Having got the sound balance right for one song the poor engineer then has to do an almost total remix for the next song which has different vocalists and a different instrumental set-up.

We're very new as bands go and therefore we still have a lot to learn. We hope that our various musical backgrounds of classical, folk, jazz and popular music will enable us to perform a diverse variety of music, all of which has our own personal stamp. We also hope to become more politically poignant, especially on the issue of serval politics.






