# Feasibility Study for **Coventry Centre**

The Coventry Coalition are carrying out a feasibility study to establish whether a lesbian, gay, bisexual & transgender resource and drop-in centre is a viable proposition for Coventry & to identify what obstacles need to be overcome to make such a development a reality. The study is supported by Coventry Health.

Questionnaires are being distributed widely throughout Coventry to existing groups and organisations and to individuals in social & community venues. Focus group meetings are being held with a range of existing groups and also with potential supporters and purchasers. Other lesbian & gay centres are being studied to learn from their successes and problems. Aspecific aspect of the work includes the health needs of lesbians.

The final report will be presented at a meeting on May 17th with a full discussion to build on findings of the study and to identify what to do next, with careful planning for future action.

# Terry takes on Navy

Terry Perkins has featured in all the national and local papers and TV news as the Nottingham ex-sailor who is taking the Royal navy to the European Court - now he tells his story in his own words for outright!

I am pleased to give outright! a brief history' says Terry.

n 1988 I left college and joined a computer company as a consultant, it was suggested that I might join the Royal Naval Reserves as a Radio Operator to improve my customer communications. But as I am colour blind this wasn't possible. But I had heard about a new branch for Medical Support Assistants. This sounded interesting, so I joined.

I was in the Reserves for 3 years at HMS Sherwood Nottingham and worked with the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, including training with the Marines in Norway. thoroughly enjoyed the life and decided I wanted to take it further. So. on 11th February 1991 I joined the Royal Navy starting at HMS Raleigh as an Acting Medical Assistant. was on basic training with 4 classes and at my Passing Out Parade I was awarded the Owen Cup for the high-

marks in the entry. In April 91 I ok additional training to further my medical knowledge and again got the highest marks in the class. As a reward my next draft was on board HMS Cornwall. After a short spell completing the basic Sea Survival Course (fire fighting & damage control) we were headed out as the West Indies Guard Ship working with the US Coast Guard in search of drug smugglers. During



my five months on board I was promoted to Medical Assistant and we visited some wonderful places -Belize, Bermuda, Curacao, Puerto Rico, Fort Lauderdale and Nassau to name but a few!

On returning to the UK I worked briefly in the sick bay at HMS Drake before joining Commando Logistics Regiment RM for preparation for the MA's Commando Course at Lympstone Exmouth. I completed 14 weeks at Lympstone at returned to Commando Logs where I was again promoted to Acting Leading Medical Assistant. During my time here I had a second journey to the West Indies attached to the Royal Marines on board HMS Fearless, visiting the jungle in Guyana as well as Bermuda & Puerto Rico again. On my return we were rewarded a short rest & relaxation period camping in Brittany with the Marines.

After this I took the Leading Medical Assistants Professional Qualifying Course and joined the main hospital at RNH Haslar as a fully fledged Leading Medical assistant. When they found out that I knew about computers too, I was also asked to support the hospital's computer system.

It was then that I told a colleague - someone I met before joining the Navy and who I thought I could trust - that I was gay. I continued working at the hospital and was awarded an engraved tankard for my work there. A month or two later I was called to see the Master at Arms, who I knew from helping him to set up his office computer. But he didn't want my help with his computer this time, instead there were two men in civilian clothing with him. I knew immediately what was happening. I was asked to give a recorded interview with the Special Investigations Branch (SIB). This was humiliating and upsetting. I was told that I was going to be discharged from the Royal Navy for being homosexual and was asked if I wanted to appeal against the deci-



sion. My solicitor, Stephen Grosz

advised me to state clearly in writ-

ing that I considered the decision

unfair, unjust and unlawful. There

was little else I could do at that

I was finally discharged in No-

vember 1995. It's totally ironic that

the same Medical Officer who


awarded me my tankard for good

service was the same person who

discharged me because of my sexu-

In July 1996 Mr Justice Sedley said in the High Court that I had a 'very arguable case' to go to the European Court of Justice. The MOD later decided that my case should wait until the case of Lisa Grant vs South West Trains is heard in Europe. This could take some considerable time so my case was reheard with Mr Justice Lightman saying that 'homosexuality is a reality that the law must adjust to'. Now I'm waiting for my case to be heard in Luxembourg.

I am now working as a Technical Consultant at Soutron Limited in Ilkeston, Derbyshire. I train customers to use the databases and library management systems that we sell. My current employers are fully aware of my case ad do not hold any prejudice. I am now living in Nottingham and I've taken a dramatic drop in salary since leaving the Navy. I will continue to fight this case and I believe that the outcome in Europe will be favourable. I will keep outright! informed.

# **New Boys in Town**

Striking silver hair & a dark brown voice all hint at Star Quality - so it comes as no surprise to learn that Martin Fox is a stalwart in a local operatic society - singing Bass naturally. In fact his biggest role -Johann Strauss - involved dying his eye-catching locks for the first time ever. 'I had a beard at the time', he explains, 'but it didn't match my hair & the Director said one or the other had to go. I used a temporary spray-on colour. I'm used to it being white - it's has been since I was in my early twenties'.

He has lots of other interests too - He's in the Labour Party (in fact he was a councillor for 6 years), supports CND and the eague Against Cruel Sports alies on the Board of Directors of a local Hospice. He says he likes DIY & gardening too - where does he find the time!

### Always an Activist

Martin worked in the Derby & District HIV/AIDS Services for around 7 years before moving to Nottingham's Health Shop. In fact he's been working in Health since 1989And an activist around HIV/AIDS since the early 80's. 'Nothing was happening then - it wasn't even called AIDS - nobody knew anything about it. I wanted to do something & made the move from social work to health'.

### Post - New Scheme

Martin's just been appointed as the Befriending Service Coordinator - a new post funded by Nottingham Community Health NHS Trust - to research, develop and set up a 'buddies' scheme in Nottingham.

There was a scheme in Nottingham organised by NAIP - but when that project folded, sadly, the buddies scheme went with it.

He brings a wealth of experience from co-ordinating the successful Derby Buddies for the last 6 years. So, he's just the man to establish a similar service in Nottingham.

The name decided on is Nott Buddies. If you've never heard of a buddies scheme before - basically, it offers practical, emotional and social support

for people living with HIV/AIDS.

### What is a buddy?

Buddies are volunteers who make a long term commitment to offer friendship & support to someone living with HIV/AIDS or their care

partner. They operate on a one-to-one basis - building up a relationship with their 'buddy' and providing additional support - their role is quite fluid and can change over time. It might involve 'being there' to give emotional support or practical help with day to day stuff like shopping or going out to the pub.

### Registering Now!

Obviously volunteers need training before they take on this type of commitment. But Martin is registering people who think they might be interested now. There will be several open evenings soon to give people a chance to find out more. Information/application packs will be available then too - but there's no pressure to apply right away. In fact I'd much rather people thought about it carefully', says Martin. 'It's going to be a rolling programme ... you can join in when you're ready ... next year or never ... whenever's 's right for you'. Partners of potential buddies are very welcome to attend the open evenings too - in fact - it's encouraged. 'Being a buddy can have an impact on your relationships-it's important for partners to understand what you're involved in'.

Being a buddy can be an extremely rewarding experiencebut it can be very demanding too. The basic requirements are commitment & confidentiality. The training is based on the Terrance Higgins Trust model and includes basic and residential week end training, on-going support meetings and reviews. 

dies their GP or other health professionals or can contact Martin direct. He'll have an initial chat with you about the type of buddy you'd like. The person who best fits your needs will then be selected from the volunteer pool & introduced to you. You can then plan between you how you want it to work. If you go ahead there'll be a review after about 6-8 weeks to see if things are going ok. If not you can always try a different buddy - your existing buddy won't take it personally. Finding the right buddy for you is the important thing.

# Hey Tom .. we need to talk

Pressure is mounting on Warwickshire Police to appoint a gay & lesbian liaison officer following criticism from regulars at the Antelope Inn at Warwick and the local gay health project mesmen.

Members of the gay community met with the assistant Chief Constable of Warwickshire last year following which the police developed a plan for further consultation and action. At a successful pub-

lic meeting in November, senior officers from both Warwickshire & West Midlands Police agreed to improve relationships by taking constructive action. Sadly, little has materialised.

Pressure has increased recently when a gay pub manager, Michael Gilday, was physically attacked on the premises of his pub, The Antelope Inn, Warwick on 1st March. The police failed to take the matter seriously and this has led to a number of written complaints from pub regulars to the Chief Constable.

'I am furious', says Michael, 'at the appalling lack of interest the police have demonstrated to gay victims of crime and I will now campaign to ensure better treatment and a change in policing in Warwickshire. A lesbian and gay liaison officer is the perfect first step'.

Gay campaigners are already considering a range of tactics to highlight police failings including a survey of homophobic violence, a letter writing campaign, public meetings with the Chief Constable and making it a local issue in the forthcoming General Election campaign with help from Stonewall. Campaigners have stressed that they would prefer to work constructively with local police and hope they will respond accordingly.

John Taylor of mesmen commented, 'It's disappointing that the police have failed to make progress since the public meeting and the development of their gay strategy. We hope they will now take the opportunity to make changes from within. If that doesn't happen, I foresee a very public campaign by local gays and lesbians to change them from the outside'.

"No one ever told me that grief felt so like fear. I am not afraid but the sensation is like being afraid. The same fluttering in the stomach, the same restlessness, the yawning. I keep on swallowing".

These words were written by C.S. Lewis on the death of his wife Joy, in his book, 'A grief Observed' which was made the moving film Shadowlands.

Some of us may be able to identify with the sentiments, indeed there may be some general pattern of grief but in the details, each person is diferent and that is how it should

For the gay man, death has become an all too familiar part of the landscape, but its familiarity doesn't lessen the pain sadness and sense of desolation felt when a partner or dearly loved friend dies.

Sometimes the feelings can be so intense that they go off the scale into numbness; at other times the heaviness is suddenly gone, to be replaced by an unexpected sense of lightness - even laughter - albeit just for a few moments before the realisation of loss comes flooding back in.

for many, one of the worst trings to cope with following the death is the 'aloneness' which is different to loneliness. Aloneness is the sense that there is no one to really talk to about the person who has died,

time after time after time. The feeling that somehow everyone expects you to be getting over it by now and that you have exhausted the early streams of sympathy and understanding you got when the news first broke.

People no longer mention his name - they might upset you; they think it best to either jolly you out of yourself or perhaps just leave you alone. It is at such times as this that aloneness can be hard to bear.

So how can one get through? Can anyone or anything really help? There are no magic cures, no pills, no easy ways out, but sometimes just sharing the feelings, letting them be aired, if necessary many times, eases the pain - a little. It takes time, perhaps a lot of time - don't feel rushed, don't accept pressure from others to 'get over it', go at your own pace. Accept the memories, which will be mixed, sometimes making you sad, sometimes making you surprisingly happy. It is all part of what in the end can only be a process moving towards acceptance. As Terence Rattigan once said "I will not insult you by trying to tell you that one day you wil forget. I know as well as you that you will not. But, at least in time you will not remember as fiercely as you do now - and I pray that that time may be **Rod Beadles**

## Gay Men's Bereavement Group

The loss of anyone that we feel close to is a difficult process. We may find it hard to accept the pain, sorrow and numbness these losses can bring. The loss of a partner is one of the greatest losses anyone can experience. Living in a society that doesn't recognise or support gay relationships can make it even harder. We aren't always surrounded by people who understand our loss. Some families may be fine in their treatment of bereaved gay men, others may try to be sympa thetic but their embarrassment and inability to relate to gay issues often means they can't can't give the support that's needed. In the worst cases the surviving partner is totally excluded from the funeral arrangements by his dead lover's family and even his own relatives seem relieved that the gay relationship they couldn't handle is over.

The gay community doesn't always handle grief very well either. For many men who've lost their partner, the idea of going back out on the scene as a single man again is horrifying. Almost like having to come out all over again. At a time when friendship and support are needed the scene can be a very daunting place.

We can't rely on colleagues appreciating our loss either. We can't count on their giving us the time and understanding they would offer to our heterosexual counterparts. In a society that barely acknowledges gay relationships there is little or no acknowledgement of gay bereave-

All this can leave us feeling isolated at a crucial time making an already difficult loss harder to bear. If we can't turn to our family or our community, if we can't find understanding and patience in our workplaces who can we

Three workers who are involved with the lives of gay men in Nottingham are trying to find out if there is a need for a gay men's bereavement group in the city. Anyone who is interested in such a group may want to come to an initial meeting in the upstairs room at The Peacock Mansfield Rd at 4pm Sun April 20. The group is open to any gay/bi man who have suffered from a close bereavement from any cause. If you want to find out more call



### Liberal Democrats

are committed to fighting discrimination wherever we may find it. Our constitution states that 'we exist to build & safeguard a fair, free and open society... in which no one shall be enslaved by poverty, ignorance or conformity.' We therefore 'reject all prejudice and discrimination based upon race, colour, religion, age, disability, sex or sexual orientation.' We feel that in our free and tolerant society, any discrimination against people on the grounds of sexuality is unacceptable. We see diversity as a great source of strength, not weakness.

The Liberal Democrats do not have add-on policies for equality, along the lines of Labour's proposed Lesbian & Gay Equality Bill. We see the issue of equal rights as a part of our overall commitment to human Rights and therefore of critical importance. Equality before the law for all will be guaranteed in our new Bill of Rights.

Despite forty years of reform since the Wolfenden Report in 1957 lesbians and gay men are still second class citizens in our society. Gays and lesbians can still be legally discriminated against. Discrimination is enforced, for example by the criminal Justice Act which sets out an age of consent for gay men. Liberal Democrats guarantee to end discrimination. We will create a common age of consent regardless of gender or sexual orientation.

When the opportunity arose in 1994, every Liberal Democrat MP present in the House of Commons voted to lower the age of consent for homosexuals to 16, to bring it into line with the heterosexual age of consent. By contrast, 38 Labour MPs voted against setting the age at 16, including the then Health & Edu-

cation spokespeople David Blunkett and Ann Taylor, and the amendment was only defeated by 27 votes. Nine Labour MPs failed to support 18.

We will repeal 'section 28' of the 1988 Local Government Act, which bans the 'promotion of homosexuality'. Many Liberal Democrat local authorities encourage inclusion within sex education an awareness of different orientations and give support to organisations giving information, advice and counselling to lesbians and gay men. We believe that there are no acceptable grounds for discriminating against homosexuals.

Banning homosexuals from serving in the British armed forces is unacceptable and the current ban should be lifted.

Liberal Democrats will also outlaw incitement to hatred, & discrimination in housing and employment on the grounds of sexual orientations. We will give same sex partners equal succession rights as for married and unmarried heterosexual couples. We will establish fair assessment procedures for prospective adoptive parents which make the suitability of prospective fosterers and the interests of the children the main criteria. In other words, sexual orientation, disability and race will not be prohibitive factors.

We are concerned at the increasing number of attacks on lesbians and gay men to which the police must respond. Stonewall estimates that 35% of lesbians & gay men have suffered violence because of their sexuality. Best practice developed by the police in dealing with racial attacks should be deployed in this area to stop these attacks from taking place. It is vital that there is equality of treatment by the police to all people. Liberal Democrats have undertaken to carry out a comprehensive review relating to sexual offenses and the boundary between law and morals. We would ensure that the evidence of agents provocateurs was rendered inadmissible and that the use of entrapment by police was outlawed. Liberal Democrats see discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation as unacceptable in today's society. We fight against it where we can and if elected to government we will take positive action to stop it.

The Conservative

party rarely gets any credit for the many steps they have taken over recent years to improve the legal position of Britain's lesbian and gay community. The decriminalisation of homosexuality and a reduction in the age of consent for gay men from 21 to 18 have become law under a Conservative government. Conservatives believe in opportunity for all- and the implementation of policies which will be of benefit to all sectors of society. And just as lesbians & gays are not defined solely by their sexuality, they do not vote on that basis alone.

Britain is booming under the Conservatives. Our management of the economy has produced the longest period of low inflation for 50 years. We have the lowest tax burden of any major European economy. Over the next parliament, our aim will be to achieve our target of a 20p base rate of income tax, while maintaining a maximum tax rate of no more than 40p. We have the lowest unemployment of any European country - including Germany And in 1995 we set ourselves the goal of doubling living standards over 25 years.

By contrast, Labour's commit-

ment a minimum wage, if set at £4.15 an hour, would destroy over 1 million jobs. Labour would sign up to the Social Chapter, jeopardising the competitive edge which has made us No.1 in Europe for foreign investment, and putting a further 1.5 million jobs at risk. We will insist at the Intergovernmental Conference in Amsterdam that our opt-out is honoured and that Britain u exempted from the new Working Time Directive: if old agreements are broken, we don't see how new ones can be made. Labour have also made 89 spending pledges costing £30 billion -£1.2000 pa per average household. Such policies would reduce the celebrated 'pink pound' to

Then there's Health. The Prime Minister's Health Service Guarantee pledges to increase NHS spending in real terms year on year during the next parliament. NHS spending has grown by 74% in real terms since 1979 & NHS patients waiting over a year for treatment has been cut from 200,000 to 22,000. We will pul lish more information on how successfully hospitals are treating patients so that they & their GPs can make more informed choices between services in different hospitals and help stimulate better performance. In addition we will promote the Private finance Initiative which will unleash a new flow of investment funds into the modernisation of the NHS.

The Government has an excellent record on law & order. Spending on the police has doubled since 1979 after allowing for inflation. There are now about 16,000 more police officers than when we took office. Recorded crime has dropped in each of the last 4 years. It is now over 10% down on 1992 levels - more than half a million fewer offences - the biggest drop since records were

first kept. We have also built 22 new prisons since 1980. Slopping out has ended and no prisoners now sleep 3 to a cell designed for 1. The Manifesto commits us to reverse Labour's wrecking amendments to our tough Crime Bill. Anyone convicted of a second serious sexual or violent crime, like rape or armed robbery, will get an automatic life sentence. We will also restore honesty in sentencing by abolishing automatic early release.

The Government has a positive vision for the european Union as a partnership of nations. We will argue for a flexible Europe which fully accomodates the interests of all its member states. We will retain Britain's veto and will take whatever steps necessary to keep our frontier ntrols. We believe it is in our national interest to keep our options open to take a decision on a single currency when all the facts are before us. If a single currency is created, without sustainable convergence, we will not be part of it. However, if a Conservative government decided that it was in our national interest to join a single currency, no such decision would be implemented unless the British people gave their express approval in a refer-

on the basis of sexuality. The vast majority of Labour MPs support changing the law to make the age of consent for gay and heterosexual sex the same. When this issue was last debated in Parliament-during the debate on the Criminal Justice Act in 1994-most Labour MPs voted in favour.

New Labour recently revised its statement of beliefs. This new statement - known as Clause IV

-includes for the first time a specific commitment on tackling prejudice. In 1994 Tony Blair became the first Labour Leader to include a reference to equality on the grounds of sexuality in his speech to Labour's annual conference. It is a pledge he repeated at the 1995 conference. More recently, in his speech about social cohesion in South Africa in October 1996, the Labour Leader stated:

"I am eager to see a Labour government make significant progress towards ending discrimination and fostering a society free of homophobic prejudice".

The Labour party is committed to a free vote as soon as it is feasible on equalising the age of consent. Both Tony Blair and Jack Straw (the shadow Home Secretary) voted for this on Edwina Currie's amendment to the Criminal Justice Bill in 1994.

The Labour party opposed section 28 of the Local Government Act in 1988, and it is our long-standing policy that we would repeal it. Our commitment to extend civil rights is contained in our pledge to incorporate the European Convention on Human Rights into British law. Article 8 of the Convention states that "everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life" and Article 14 states that "the enjoyment of the rights and freedoms set forth in this Convention shall be secured without discrimination on any ground".

Labour believes that people should not be discharged from the military simply on the basis that they are gay. In government Labour will therefore review the situation in order to evolve a solution.

If we want to be tough on discrimination we have to be tough on crime too. Though our society is now more open and accepting of gay relationships, gay people are still disproportionately likely to be the victims of harassment and attack.

In the last five years 1 in 3 gay men, and 1 in 4 lesbians have experienced violent attacks; 32% have been harassed, and 73% have been verbally abused on the basis of their sexuality.

Often, it starts in an apparently small way - with bullying, taunts and insults - then graduates to graffiti and criminal damage. As

the perpetrators discover how ineffective the law is in dealing with 'lower level' disorder, their behaviour escalates.

Labour is committed to a strategy of 'zero tolerance', to make the streets safe for everyone, regardless of the colour of their skin or their sexual preference.

In government we intend quickly to introduce 'community safety orders' to deal with this type of chronic, low level abuse which cannot be dealt with by the current law. These orders help all law members of the community, but they will be especially useful in cracking down on those who target gay minorities.

Labour sees the HIV virus representing one of the biggest public health challenges we face. We have proposed to meet this challenge by formulating a national AIDS strategy aimed at combatting the spread of HIV. We see a central role for government in educating and informing the public, for ensuring that people with HIV/AIDS are properly cared for and for promoting the contribution of Britain's scientists to the international search for a cure and vaccine.

We must also tackle the harm caused by discrimination against those living with the virus. Labour MPs and their colleagues in the House of Lords put forward amendments to the Employment Bill to prohibit discrimination on false grounds against HIV status in terms of employment. The government issued guidance to employers but refused to give this the force of law. Labour members of the All Party Parliamentary Group on HIV/AIDS helped in an intensive lobbying campaign to change the wording on HIV status on questionnaires used by the insurance industry.

Labour has consistently spoken out on gay and lesbian issues. The Leader has given his personal backing for action against discrimination. We have a firm set of commitments for government. Make your vote count on May the first.



# Stars Shine for Local Charity!

On World AIDS Day 1995, The Peterhouse
Trust was launched with a big event at
Nottingham Castle. Although, obviously the
group behind the Trust had been working
together for several months prior to this. In fact,
it all really started exactly one year earlier, when
two volunteers raising money for the Captain's Fund
sat down and talked about what the area really needed in

terms of support. They decided that one thing that was missing was local facilities for respite care. Somewhere that people living with HIV/AIDS could go for a short break or just a rest and that would allow their carers to have a break too.

'There are existing respite care facilities', say Kay Paul, one of the trustees, 'Bournemouth springs to mind and the London Lighthouse of course, there's even a place in Ibiza. But the travel involved, particularly to Bournemouth and even more so to Ibiza can be pretty gruelling. You need to be quite fit to undertake the journey'. Cost is a factor too. Respite stays at London Lighthouse cost well over £300 per night. Obviously funding is available for respite care, but it doesn't make much sense for the local health authority to pay out huge sums like that when the budget would go much further using a local service. Most people prefer to stay in their own area anyway to remain near friends and family.

So, The Peterhouse Trust is committed to establishing a local respite care facility in the East Midlands - although it would be open to people outside the area too. They've been fundraising for two years and have raised a substantial sum. 'But we would need around half a million to cover the cost of buying a property plus refurbishment and adaptaions etc', says Kay. An alternative route the Trust is exploring is becoming the managing agent of a suitable property for an established housing association. 'That would releive us of upkeep costs and overheads, provide some

regular income and allow us to dedicate our funds to equipping the premises to a very high standard'.

As part of their fund-raising and publicity drive they've written to a host of celebraties and have received lots of supportive replies. Alan Bennet and local writer Alan Silitoe for example and Robbie Coltraine wrote 'a great supportive letter' but is already fully committed to work with HIV/AIDS projects in Scotland.

The group were really thrilled when **Dame Judi Dench** and **John Hurt** agreed to become patrons of the charity and they've been joined by **Cynthia Payne**, "Who's been wonderful", says Kay.

Cynthia says, "The Peterhouse Trust has shown tremendous commitment to establishing services and facilities in the area of respite care for people affected by HIV and I am very pleased to lend my support to this vital area of work."

And those aren't just empty words - Britain's most famous Madame will be in court again on Saturday April 5th, at the Galleries of Justice Nottm. - with a very special performance of her one woman show to raise funds for the Trust. The fun packed evening includes a tour of the Galleries - rapidly becoming one of Nottingham's most famous landmarks, followed by cabaret, buffet and 'enough wine to sink Parkhurst jail'. Tickets for the benefit cost £39.50.


# The Investigator



#### Passionate Circus

"Acid - for example, lemon juice, consumed in large quantities during pregnancy may cause freakish abnormalities in your baby, such that it may be possible to sell her/him to a circus for a large sum of money".

Rubbish, of course, but believed by quite a number of people in the nineteenth century according to Victor Hugo in his book 'The Man Who Laughs'.

This example of chilling gullibility was one of a number of ideas which inspired the composition of **Acid Circus** by Shane Cullinan, which had its first performance at the Congregational Hall in Nottingham on Tuesday 13th March. It was a very ambitious work for an orchestra of 50 including piano, harp and guitar, narrators, vocal soloists and a small group of singers. The hall was packed and the audience gave the work a standing ovation.

Shane is a gay final year Performing Arts student in Nottingham and this work is his dissertation. It shows the influence of several composers, including Arvo Part and Stephen Sondheim. "I've been working on Acid Circus for a very long time", says Shane. "I wrote one song at the age of 15".

The central characters are twins-brother & sister who run away from the circus but are still haunted by characters from their past. The Siamese Twins Chang & Eng for example and Tom Thumb and Lavinia Warren, the famous dwarves, whose wedding forms a central feature of the work. A major source of research for Shane was Frederick Primmer's book Very Special People.

Contrary to what you might expect the whole tone is upbeat and affirmative. Extremes in emotion and relationships are examined and the support and commitment inherent in the relationships of the three main 'couples' are clear. We see how a discarded minority can find great strength through their intense personal relationships - a theme with wider application.

Shane intends developing Acid Circus into a full stage event and would really like to team up with a librettist who would be willing to help him work on the text. Anyone interested can contact outright! and we'll pass your names along.

I feel sure we'll be hearing more of Shane, he shows much talent and a wealth of musical and textual ideas. For the audience on the 13th - what we heard will resonate in our minds for some time - and one day we'll be able to say "I heard his first work, here, in Nottingham".

When I got my first period, I can remember my mum hugging me and giving me one of those long looks full of parental pride - you know - the ones that say you're so grown up. Dad shuffled round the kitchen, cleared his throat a few times and attempted a sentence with the word Congratulations in it. I don't know who was more embarrassed him or me.

Voting for the first time was a similar experience,I drove my mum frantic when I was eighteen. I never left the house, had no friends and spent all my time in my bedroom listening to The Smiths and pouring out my unrequited love in verse. You know the sort of thing - Oh Ange, I yearn for thee endlessly, why don'tcha bloody fancy me - hardly a career option. Anyway she thought voting would at least get me out of the house once in a while.

The trouble was I didn't have any politics. When I was younger I quite wanted Michael Heseltine to be my dad. Not because I bask un-

der a sun that shines blue or anything - just because he was so damn debonair. I imagined him dropping me off at the school disco and my friends thinking 'Wow cool dad!'. A bit earlier I'd picked David Owen as a fantasy relative - dropping me off at the Brownies etc.etc.


I am one of Thatcher's children, an aspiring Luppie, (lesbian upwardly mobile). I would like the Dockland flat, designer trouser suit, mobile phone etc. But I don't actually want to work 24 hours a day for them or anything. Which is probably why I became a Loddie, (lesbian on dole) for a couple of years. Anyway, mum finally dragged me out of the house to vote 'There's a Morrissey CD in it for you darling'. And voted Labour. Why? Who knows. I like red? The rose is such a romantic symbol? Once again mum beamed with pride & dad shuffled round the kitchen.

It wasn't until the age of consent hoo-ha that I started to think about how politics affects ME. My parent's lifetime subscription to the Daily Mail had me airing my first political opinion.

On reading a Littlejohnesque editorial on the debate I shouted 'Bollocks!' at the top of my voice. Mum grabbed me and threw me into the garden and locked the door, (you just don't swear in my mum's house right). It was 11pm and frigging freezing. 2 hours later she let me back in and gave me a cup of tea. Yeah - like that will cure hypothermia.

I went off to my room and wrote to every politician I could think of - "I've just spent 2 hours freezing my mammeries off because you're a raving bigot ... When I watched the results on Newsnight and saw that we'd 'achieved' 18 I shook with anger and powerlessness. 18 was a compromise - but the issue politically mobilised a generation of lesbian, gay and bisexual men & women. If it hadn't been for groups like Stonewall & Outrage it would probably still be 21. Just being lesbian, gay or bisexual is political. So if you're thinking -Voting - no point - think again. Go round to my mum's house, yell a few obscenities and find your politics. I found mine near the lupins.
