ello and welcome everyone to the first edition of the re-issued NDVF newsletter.

As this is the first opportunity for some time to circulate information in a concise way to all Service Users, NDVF will dedicate this edition to summarising who NDVF are today, as well providing details of all the new Project initiatives that have developed over the last two years.

Domestic Violence Forum, re-launched in 1995, is an inter-agency initiative that brings together a range of organisations dealing with domestic violence in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. 'NDVF' aims to produce a more effective response to tackling domestic violence. The Forum, currently with just under 200 service users, including organisations and individuals, meets 4 times a year. The Steering Group Members,

elected from NDVF's subscribers meets one a month. The core services offered by NDVF are funded by the Nottinghamshire Social Services and the Nottingham City Council. NDVF currently employs 4 paid workers: Development Worker, Project Worker, Educator Worker and a Part-time Administrator.

Since the successful running of the 2 - year Awareness Campaign, Free From Fear', NDVF has evolved considerably, both in the eyes of the public as well as the Statutory, voluntary and private sectors. Funding has been secured over the last two years to develop many new exciting projects which has resulted in NDVF needing to re-visit it's constitution and internal policies and codes of practice.

Users agreed at an Annual General Meeting held on 1st November 2000 to update the constitution to reflect the following aims and objectives:



DVF aims to reduce domestic violence by strengthening interagency working, raising public awareness and changing attitudes.

In recognition of the fact that the overwhelming majority of domestic violence and abuse is experienced by women and children and is perpetrated by men known to them, NDVF will give priority to supporting developments that maximise choices and services available to women and children. However, NDVF also recognises the existence of women's abuse of men and abuse in same sex relationships and will support initiatives to address these issues where appropriate.

he definition of domestic violence used by NDVF has been removed as a feature of the constitution. The definition is to be re-worded and issued as an appendix in the forth coming months •

NDVF PROJECTS

Nottingham Health Action Zone By Mo Cooper, Development Worker

I started working at the Forum in December 2000, previously having worked in the voluntary sector for over twenty years, mainly in Liverpool and London. As Development worker my job is to

manage the HAZ programme and develop new ideas and initiatives.

Along side the lottery funded Free From Fear public awareness campaign the forum's other major area of activity (and funding) has been within the Nottingham Health Action Zone. The forum is the lead organisation (referred to as a work stream lead) for the domestic violence thread of the programme and we have been able to help develop a number of projects.

The three large scale projects we have provided funding for are: the Women's Aid Advice centre 24 hours free phone help line, the Educator Project and the Information and Resource Project (the last two are reported on later).

The Phone line opened in August 2000 to provide direct support for women, children and service providers in relation to domestic violence. It is linked to Language line and / mini com service. HAZ has part funded the project over three years (including 2001/02) and WAAC are actively seeking financial support to ensure that the service continues.

We have also funded five small projects during 2000/01:

DOVINA - drop in centre in West Bridgford operational since Oct 2000 NG7 Project -outreach work in NG7 area

Lawyers against Domestic Abuse
-translation of legal information
leaflets into 11 community
languages

Information cards - translation of information cards and flyers into 11 community languages

Mandatory Training - programme for those involved in the forum. We have run training in race awareness and disability awareness - see section on training later for future programme.

Broxtowe Women's Project has also set up a project in north Broxtowe under the homelessness workstream funding)

As part of our role as workstream lead we work with the Health Authority and other HAZ work streams to ensure that the impact of domestic violence understood

HAZ is due to finish in March 2002. There is a slight possibility that a few areas will be granted an extension and Nottingham are trying to ensure that they are one of the leasing zones in the country. HAZ effectively funds the majority of forum work at present therefore it is important for us to find other sustainable funding packages to continue are work, and that of other projects working on domestic violence issues.

Educator Project - Karen Butler

I have recently been appointed as a Young People and Domestic Violence Worker by NDVF.

As a secondary school teacher and tutor, I gained extensive experience of developing and supporting young people and played an active role in their personal, social and health education. These experiences are complimented by my training and subsequent work as a volunteer for Child-line.

Research shows that young people are affected by domestic violence even when it is not aimed at them. Therefore, NDVF has prioritised developing the Education Project to work with young people in a variety of settings, as well as those who work with young people.

The aim of the Educator Project is to facilitate a long-term reduction in domestic violence by:

- Challenging the legacy of violence and outdated ideologies and attitudes
- Empowering young people to value non-abusive relationships and their health (emotional, physical & sexual)
- Increasing awareness of domestic violence and the choices and services available to those experiencing; and



Strengthening inter-agency partnership, policy & practice.

The Educator Project is in the developmental stages, however, it is expected to include training staff in schools and youth clubs, educating young people in schools, youth clubs and on the streets and developing a peer education programme.

Information & Resource Project - Cate Hodgkinson. Project Worker

The Nottinghamshire Domestic Violence Forum is developing a central source for domestic violence information and resources accessible to all Services in Nottinghamshire.

It is hoped that information and statistics from all agencies can be collated and maintained in order to support the partnership framework and encourage a consistent service delivery.

The production of NDVF NEWS! is a part of this project and in the near future we are also aiming to have our own webpage and articles in other on-line sites. We will keep you up to date with developments as they occur.

Disability Sub Group

The forum has set up a sub group to consider issues around disability. This came out of previous seminars are training on disability delivered last year. It's early days but we are looking at an action plan that will cover

- Domestic Violence awareness training to specialist disability groups
- Outreach to connect with individual disabled women
- Disability training for those of us working on domestic violence issues
- How the forum complies with good practice and be more accessible to disabled people.

TRI (Training, Resources and Information)

Most people will know that Agenda, the Nottingham based project that worked with male perpetrators, and providing training on working with men, closed last year, leaving a big gap in service provision.
