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
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ORDERS TO Char ting 76410

(4) to encourage a discussion about the purpose of IF YOU DON'T There will be a questionaire in the next issue (what is IF, what should it be?) and at least one viewpoint & criticism.

(5) to have a constant address: 15 Scotholme Ave, Hyson Green.

A SPECIAL ISSUE on FASCISM will be produced in the next 2 or 3 weeks. Unlike the monthly issues it will cost something (probably 5p) and be totally devoted to articles/cartoons against Fascism.

#### THE POLITICAL ECONOMY OF NOTTINGHAM GROUP

Our objectives are broadly to develop knowledge of the changing political and economic picture in Nottingham and its relationship to political and economic currents in the region, UK, EEC and international markets. Specifically to consider the impact that political and economic changes will have on the people who live and work in Nottingham—(shire). We want to look at how people's lives are constrained and what restricts us in directing and influencing our living and working conditions. This will involve investigating patterns of ownership, control and capital investment. We want this to be more than an academic study and hope it will be of practical use.

So far we have begun to look at industry in Nottingham and the County Council's proposed structure plan. We are collecting information and intend to publish our findings and analysis. Obviously, we need HELP. We need people who share our perspectives to join us to pool their knowledge and experience with ours. Bel

Below are some of the questions we want to answer. This is not an exhaustive or inflexible list. We want to include the issues that people are facing and fighting now and to see how they have responded in the past.

Who owns the factories which provide jobs? What is their position in their market and the state of that market in the UK/World? What are their long term investment plans and past investment records? What are their other interests and connections? What changes might they like in the labour force and where would they like it housed? The structure

might they like in the labour force and where would they like it housed? The structure of industry - what is the percentage of small/large companies; the number of multinationals etc? What has been TU/workers' response? Could it be different/more effective?

2. Land/Property/Shops

Who owns the land which might be used for future development? What are the interests here - will they restrict its use? What are local government's plans for the development of different forms of land and in which areas will/can they enforce them? Where could speculative office development occur? What do the people who live in Nottingham want in the city centre - shops, parks, markets?

Who owns the housing? What demands are there for different types of housing or its location. What are the economic constraints on either the private or public sector providing this housing in different areas? What is the past, present and future pattern of residential development? What are the consequences of this for transport and industry? What do the people who live there think (and do) about it?

Which jobs/sections are declining? What sort of jobs are available for men and women and immigrant labour? What rates of pay are there? Is outwork declining? What percentage are on the dole and who are they?

5. The State
Just what does it influence? Roads, aid to industry - directly and indirectly etc.

6. Education
What is the nature of educational provision at all levels - nursery - further and higher - part/full time? Does industry even pay for the influence it has in education?

7. Health Care/Social Services
What health provision is there? Is there an inbalance in health care within the region?
How overstretched are resources? Don't waiting lists make you sick?



## RADIO TRENT DISPUTE

When Radio Trent came on air in July 1975 the only union members in the building were a few journalists. By March 1976 all the journalists in the news room had been organised into a chapel of the National Union of Journalists, and the disc jockeys and programme director had joined the Association of Broadcasting Staffs. Both unions had a nationally negotiated agreement with the employers' association, the Association of Independent Radio Contractors (AIRC). However, Radio Trent was refusing to sign this agreement, saying that to do so would break the pay code. Negotiations for the signing of the agreement were underway and at a meeting of union members at the end of April it was decided to give the company until May 28th to sign the agreement. However, on May 9th the programme director was dismissed contrary to the terms of the disciplinary code laid down in the agreement. Union members responded by holding a mandatory meeting in one of Trent's on-air studios. Twenty people sat for 36 hours in a small studio (approx. 6' x 14'). At the end of that time the programme director was reinstated.

On May 28th the company was still refusing to sign the agreement.

After a joint union meeting which started at 2 pm and lasted until 9 pm,
union members decided to declare a strike from midnight that night. One
of Radio Trent's journalists announced the strike at the end of the
11 pm news bulletin. On Sunday, May 30th, the agreement was signed.

There was no doubt in the minds of those who had taken part in these actions that they were entirely successful. Both actions had been unconstitutional as far as union headquarters in London were concerned, but union members had become aware that they could at least have some influence over their own conditions of work.

The last action at Trent (at time of writing) was a rather different story. The company still argued that to implement the pay scales laid down in the agreement would break the pay code and they and the NUJ took the matter to CAC. Union members held a meeting to discuss the case, and it was during this meeting that an NUJ member was summoned to the managing director's office and accused of spreading malicious 'gossip' designed to undermine the management, and threatened with legal and disciplinary action.

At the end of the previous dispute, however, the management had signed a document. saying that no disciplinary action would be taken against any member of staff for a period of three months. Union members considered that threats such as those issued to the NUJ member constituted a breach of that agreement. After a prolonged and heated meeting the hoint union membership took over the on-air suite of studios and remained there for about 30 hours. After quitting the building and receiving assurances from the management that no disciplinary action was intended against the NUJ member, union members voted to return to work on Monday (it was then Friday evening). But on Saturday the general secretary of the ABS came to Nottingham, unknown to his members, met the management, and agreed to their terms. On Sunday union members received hand-delivered letters from the management demanding that each member should sign a statement on returning to work to the effect that they would not take part in any unconstitutional action in the future. This was backed up by a letter from the general secretary of the ABS ordering members of that union to agree to such a condition. The membership felt that such a condition was unacceptable, and were refused entry to Radio Trent when they presented themselves for work on Monday morning.

In fact the dispute dragged on until the Thursday of that week, when both unions took the matter to ACAS where a settlement was achieved. The lesson that many people learned from the whole muddle was that a full-time union official is a full-time union official. It is unlikely that any future problems at Radio Trent will be expressed through industrial action (at least in the forseeable future) because of the demoralisation suffered wgen ABS members found out what they had really joined. In fact, it is unlikely that any action would have been taken at all but for the complete inexperience of those involved, but it would be difficult to find anyone at Radio Trent who took part in the events of the summer of 1976 who'll say they regret it.

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#### MAY DAY 77

Throughout the world, and perhaps beyond, May 1st is celebrated as a festival of working class/labour solidarity. In communist states and fascist ones, in liberal democracies and puppet regimes, people throw off their local oppression and march in the spirit of belonging to something bigger than the local branch of a trade union or political party. How do we mark this event in Nottingham? Usually with one of a series of the most boring marches I have ever been involved in. Last year's usual dismal procession was enlivened by the "other groups at the back", where the atmosphere was friendly, the banners colourful and there were smiles.

This year I had hoped that more could be done to put more fun into the proceedings. A larger contingent of "other groups", perhaps, with more colour, balloons, kids, singing and dancing. However, this year there will be no Nottingham May Day March. The Trades Council and allied groups are instead putting their efforts into supporting the National Union of Public Employees (NUPE) Day of Action against the cuts on Wednesday April 27th. This will involve a demonstration assembling at County Hall. Nottingham Voice is under the impression that "it all makes a welcome change from the usual pathetic May Day Rally", but a dismal demo is a dismal demo no matter when or where. #### OFFICIAL SECRETS

Five people have recently found themselves caught up in a government backlash concerning 'official secrets'. Two American journalists, Philip Agee and Mark Hosenball, whose work had included investigation of the activities of the American Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) are to be deported. Three others, journalists Duncan Campbell and Crispin Aubrey and ex-soldier John Berry have been charged under the Official Secrets Act.

This is not a case of people flogging off the secrets of one Big Power to another Big Power; all were concerned with investigating and exposing the secret activities of the state which affect us. It's obvious that much of the state's defences against 'foreign attack' are better suited and more likely to be used against internal threats to its existance. Secret alternative seats of government, secret national communication links, supply depots and all the rest would serve nicely in times of civil unrest. With the army increasingly trained in street fighting and with advances in police-army operations the state is well prepared.

Naturally though they like to keep these preparations secret and that's why 'D' notices, Official Secrets Act, libel laws, deportations and so on are being increasingly used to restrict the flow of information. And that's largely what's at stake: the right to know. Parts of the media in America have played an important part in informing people of what is being done in their name in Vietnam, Chile and half of the rest of the world.

It is important that we should defend the limited freedom of the press we have, that we demand the right of freedom of information and fight back against the Official Secrets Act and the deportations.

Anyway back to the main purpose of this article. There is to be a public meeting of the Aubrey/Berry/Campbell Defence Campaign at Trent Polytechnic in Nottingham, not far from the old public library. Crispin Aubrey, on the editorial collective of 'TIME OUT' and one of the three defendants, will be speaking.



# campaign against a criminal trespass law

A BILL HAS BEEN ACCEPTED BY THE GOVERNMENT, WHICH PROPOSES 5 NEW CRIMINAL OFFENCES THESE FORM A DANGEROUS THREAT TO ALL OCCUPATIONS, HOWEVER PEACEFUL. THIS BILL WILL
SOON GO BEFORE PARLIAMENT. PUT FORWARD BY THE LAW COMMISSION IN THEIR FINAL REPORT
ON CONSPIRACY & TRESPASS, IT HAS BEEN PUBLICISED FALSELY AS ONLY AFFECTING SQUATTING.
IN FACT, UNDER THESE NEW OFFENCES -

## YOU COULD BE ARRESTED FOR TAKING PART IN OCCUPATIONS AT WORK, COLLEGE & TOWN HALL

AT the beginning of the occupation, the security guards or caretakers claim that you 'threatened them with violence' - if you outnumber them, that alone can constitute a 'threat of violence' under law.

OFFENCE: "VIOLENCE FOR SECURING ENTRY" SENTENCE: UP TO 2 YEARS IN PRISON

THE security guards claim that you intended to use your placards or the tools which you used to get into the building as 'offensive weapons'.

OFFENCE: "TRESPASSING WITH AN OFFENSIVE WEAPON" SENTENCE: UP TO 2 YEARS IN PRISCN

YOUR boss or college authorities take out an eviction order against your occupation or work-in, & you 'obstruct' or 'resist' the court officers carrying out the eviction in any way, however peacefully.

OFFENCE: "OBSTRUCTION OF COURT OFFICERS EXECUTING POSSESSION ORDERS 113 & 26" SENTENCE: UP TO 6 MONTHS IN PRISON &/OR £400 FINE

IN ALL THESE CASES, THE UNSUPPORTED ALLEGATIONS OF A BOSS' STOOGE ARE ENOUGH TO BRING DOWN IMMEDIATE POLICE INTERVENTION AND ARRESTS.

### OCCUPATIONS OF EMPTY HOUSES

THE property-owner, by putting a few sticks of furniture in his/her empty property and claiming to sleep there once in a while, pretended that the house was used.

OFFENCE: "ADVERSE OCCUPATION OF RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY" SENTENCE: UP TO 6 MONTHS IN PRISON &/OR £400 FINE

YOU have tools on you for getting into or doing up an empty house, like a screwdriver, or you have a kitchen knife in your kitchen.

OFFENCE: "TRESPASSING WITH AN OFFENSIVE WEAPON" SENTENCE: UP TO 2 YEARS IN PRISON

YOU resist even passively an eviction by court officers. Licencees, for instance people living in tied accommodation, are open to this charge also.

OFFENCE: "OBSTRUCTION OF COURT OFFICERS EXECUTING POSSESSION ORDERS 113 & 26" SENTENCE: UP TO 6 MONTHS IN PRISON &/OR £400 FINE

## OCCUPATIONS OF EMBASSIES

ALL occupations, however peaceful, of places having 'diplomatic inviolability' become crimes. Foreigners occupying in protest against a fascist regime in their country - like Iran - face deportation into the hands of that regime.

OFFENCE: "TRESPASSING ON PREMISES OF EMBASSIES ETC." SENTENCE: UP TO 1 YEAR IN PRISON

The Law Commission make no attempt to produce evidence that these new offences are in any way necessary. They have produced this repressive Bill as a result of pressure from property-owners, who run scared from the direct actions we are forced to take in our fight to save jobs, improve our living standards, and win decent housing and education for all. The viciousness of this Bill becomes even clearer, when we see what

## THIS BILL WILL LEGALISE: VIOLENT EVICTIONS

The Bill specifically ALLOWS "displaced residential occupiers" to take "ANY ACTION" - INCLUDING VIOLENCE - to evict 'unlawful occupiers'. What is a "displaced residential occupier"? The definition is so loose that a property-owner, by claiming to have been using a house, will be allowed to use violence to evict, without a court order, anyone who cannot prove their right to be there.

## POLICE INTERVENTION AT ANY OCCUPATION

In every offence, the police are given the power of arrest without warrant. So they could enter any occupation, without a warrant, on the word of any employer's, land-lord's or college's stooge that an offence has been committed.

## EVICTIONS WHEN PEOPLE AWAY FROM HOME

The Law Commission plan to abolish the Forcible Entry Acts, which protect people in any occupation from being forcible evicted without being taken to court. Their new offence, "violence for securing entry", only applies when someone's on the property at the time, who's opposed to the violent entry.

## THE THIN END OF THE WEDGE

This Bill is vicious & repressive. It would give property-owners for the first time a statutory right to violently evict. It would give bailiffs the power of arrest - bailiffs are often a property-owner's employees, licenced to carry out a specific eviction, & have a vested interest in it. People wrongly evicted under this Bill could do nothing about it until after the event, if at all.

THE GOVERNMENT WANTS TO MAKE TRESPASS IN SOME SITUATIONS A CRIME. ONCE THE PRINCIPLE THAT TRESPASS CAN BE A CRIME IS ACCEPTED, THIS OR ANY FUTURE GOVERNMENT CAN EXTEND IT TO COVER MORE & MORE SITUATIONS. THE SPEEDED-UP EVICTION ORDERS INTRODUCED IN 1970 AS ANTI-SQUATTING MEASURES HAVE ALREADY BEEN USED AGAINST OCCUPATIONS BY WORKERS (eg Crosfields Engineering 1975) & BY STUDENTS (eg Warwick University 1975). THIS NEW BILL IS THE THIN END OF THE WEDGE. IT WILL SOON COME BEFORE PARLIAMENT. FIGHT IT NOW & STOP ALL MOVES TO MAKE OCCUPATIONS CRIMINAL.

## THE FIGHT BACK: WHAT YOU CAN DO

- 1/ Get your Trades Union, Labour Party, Student, Community organisation to discuss this Bill, & pass a resolution opposing it & supporting CACTL. Send it on to CACTL, to local MPs, & thro' to regional & national levels of your organisation.
- 2/ Work with your local CACTL group, or set one up. Set up a public meeting, publicise the Bill & promote discussion of it. We can supply speakers & leaflets.
- 3/ Lobby your local MP, & organise a mass lobby they will vote the Bill in or out.
- 4/ Make 'NO TO ANY CRIMINAL TRESPASS LAWS' a demand in any direct action you take.
- 5/ Support us financially to fund leaflets, posters, mailings, hall hirings, which are vital to the campaign. Cheques payable to CACTL.

## LESSONS OF A STRIKE SUPPORT GROUP

A strike at a Basford lace factory was happily and convincingly won in the middle of March after a small but determined group of T&G members had picketed the factory for 3 days.

The issue looked quite clear: Janet, a canteen assistant had temporarily (and successfully) filled in as canteen manager for three months. Then the bosses appointed a permanent manager from another department who had had no recent catering experience and this led the other canteen workers to get up a petition for Janet to be their manager. The local T&G members backed this and thought that they had negotiated a less than perfect compromise with Janet and Carol (another canteen worker) both being up-graded to cooks but to work under the new supervisor.

The next day the bosses had gone back on this compromise and so 15 of the 17 T&G members immediately went on strike, picketing the factory gates and successfully using other union contacts in the area to help block factory goods movements.

After three days of this the bosses accepted the original strike demand and Janet and Carol were both upgraded to cooks. This was not a perfect solution to the original petition for Janet to be the new manager but it was a convincing victory for Janet and Carol who stuck together when the bosses tried to divide them. It was also a convincing victory for the small T&G branch whoose recent foundation had made the bosses encourage the formation of a Hosiery Workers Union branch (which now has a supervisor as rep!)

#### SUPPORT GROUP IN ACTION

A loosely connected group of people who live in the area near the factory got together as soon as they heard about the strike in order to provide whatever support we could.

In one afternoon we got together a leaflet giving details of the reasons for the strike and delivered most of these to the picket for use at the gates and in the local area. We kept some leaflets to help recruit further outside support and for fundraising. That evening £6.50 was raised at the Evelyn Reed meeting and a further £1.50 was raised at a disco. All this eventually went to the strikers which did a bit to help make up their lost pay (and they are very grateful to all who contributed.) We also considerably reinforced the picket during the following day.


#### SOME LESSONS

The support group was not well prepared and worked spontaneously rather than cohesively. At various times this left people feeling 'un consulted!. With no time (or desire?) to set up a formal structure, this was probably inevitable, but it sometimes looked like becoming destructive.

Hopefully, if the strike had continued, the support group would have settled down just as some of the initial shyness between strikers and supporters started to evaporate on the second day. At the same time it is a bit too easy to attribute the diffaculties to the urgency of the situation when none of could actually be suprised at finding ourselves involved in a strike.

How close were we to making mistakes that would have been badly counterproductive in the short or long term? Can we and will we be more
positively prepared next time? And, finally, does anyone else whether or
not they were involved in Basford feel that there is a need to discuss/
think more about strike support group roles and tactics.

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
